BUDGET DU PROGRAMME D'AIDE À LA CONFORMITÉ DU PNUE POUR 2026

Introduction

1. Le PNUE a soumis le budget de son Programme d'aide à la conformité (PAC) pour 2026, au coût total de 11 276 967 \$US, plus des coûts d'appui d'agence de 902 157 \$US. La demande comprend le rapport périodique de 2025 et le programme de travail de 2026, qui sont joints au présent document.

2. Le plan de travail du PAC, proposé pour 2026, est soumis pour la dernière année de la stratégie triennale 2024-2026 du PAC.

Rapport périodique du PAC pour 2025

3. Le rapport périodique est inclus dans la Partie II de la demande jointe et de plus amples détails sont fournis dans les annexes. La demande décrit les résultats et les impacts pertinents de la mise en œuvre du PAC. Le PAC du PNUE a mis en œuvre les activités suivantes de septembre 2024 à août 2025 :

- a) Il a continué à faire fonctionner les réseaux régionaux des administrateurs nationaux de l'ozone (NOO) dans toutes les 10 régions et organisé 24 réunions thématiques et de réseau sur des sujets pertinents pour la conformité au Protocole de Montréal; a formé 84 nouveaux NOO et assistants dans cinq régions à travers le programme de formation des NOO pour améliorer la capacité des services nationaux de l'ozone (UNO) à traiter des enjeux émergents et faciliter l'échange d'information et de pratiques exemplaires; développé une formation courte sur les compétences de négociation pour une participation efficace aux réunions du Protocole de Montréal et du Fonds multilatéral;
- b) Il a soutenu 34 pays qui avaient besoin d'une aide particulière, à travers des échanges de pays à pays, le partage d'expériences et des voyages d'étude sur des sujets, tels que la gestion des frontières, la mise en œuvre et la surveillance des Normes minimales de

performance énergétique (NMPE), la destruction des SAO et des HFC, et les plateformes électroniques de suivi des quotas de HCFC et HFC; tenu 50 sessions d'information dans sept régions afin d'aider les UNO à développer des méthodes pour établir des inventaires des substances réglementaires utilisées ou indésirables et identifier des stratégies et des modèles d'affaire conformément à la décision 91/66;

- c) Il a fourni de l'aide à la conformité, soutenu la collecte des données dans les 147 pays visés à l'article 5; fait un suivi régulier de la communication des données exigées en vertu de l'article 7 et dans le programme de pays; soutenu toutes les UNO pour l'analyse des données commerciales, la correction des incohérences et la compréhension des données annuelles agrégées sur les exportations provenant du Secrétariat de l'ozone; informé les UNO des différentes approches, par des activités de sensibilisation et d'éducation, pour améliorer leurs systèmes nationaux de suivi du Protocole de Montréal, rapports, vérification et d'application de la loi; fait la promotion du mécanisme informel de consentement préalable éclairé;
- d) Il a fourni une aide à la conformité individualisée dans 59 pays; soutenu la mise en œuvre de projets de renforcement des institutions dans 101 pays; soutenu la formation en ligne sur la communication des données du programme de pays dans 58 pays; fourni des orientations aux UNO intéressées du Groupe 2 de pays sur l'établissement des valeurs de référence pour les HFC et des points de départ des réductions durables; soutenu 12 pays dans la ratification de l'Amendement de Kigali, en collaboration avec le Secrétariat de l'ozone;
- e) Il a soutenu l'adoption de mesures législatives sur des enjeux mis en lumière par le Groupe de l'évaluation technique et économique (GETE), tels que l'extinction des incendies et la gestion du cycle de vie des frigorigènes; aidé des pays dans l'instauration ou l'amélioration des systèmes de permis et de quotas pour les HFC, et le renforcement des cadres réglementaires sur les HCFC pour lutter contre le commerce illicite; et soutenu toutes les UNO dans l'acquisition d'une meilleure compréhension des questions techniques et réglementaires relatives aux HFC et aux produits de remplacement utilisés dans les secteurs de la climatisation mobile et de la chaîne du froid;
- f) Il a développé un Outil de suivi et de surveillance des quotas de HFC pour aider les UNO à suivre l'utilisation des quotas de HFC, en tonnes d'équivalent CO₂, afin d'assurer la conformité à l'Amendement de Kigali; fourni 40 outils, incluant des vidéos, applications, guides et matériel de formation, développés par le PNUE et ses partenaires pour donner une formation technique aux agents des douanes (par ex., le manuel de formation du PNUE et de l'Organisation mondiale des douanes (OMD) pour les autorités douanières, les lignes directrices réglementaires modèles Unies pour l'efficacité (U4E) concernant les réfrigérateurs, le guide sur les gaz fluorés de l'Association européenne de climatisation et de réfrigération (AREA), un article pour OzonAction/ClimaCheck sur le refroidissement durable, et l'application What-Gas);
- g) Il a poursuivi les activités de renforcement des compétences dans les pays pour améliorer la manipulation des frigorigènes, minimiser les fuites et maintenir/améliorer l'efficacité énergétique des appareils de réfrigération et de climatisation (RAC); encouragé l'adoption des manuels de formation du PNUE/AREA et des cours d'apprentissage en ligne; aidé neuf universités à intégrer le cours universitaire PNUE-ASHRAE² sur la gestion des frigorigènes dans les programmes de formation des ingénieurs; fourni une assistance technique et stratégique pour développer des programmes nationaux d'accréditation en RAC;

- h) Il a facilité des synergies entre les UNO et les décideurs nationaux en matière d'efficacité énergétique ainsi que des liens financiers, à travers des ateliers de jumelage des NOO avec les décideurs en matière d'efficacité énergétique qui ont réuni 422 participants; fait le suivi des recommandations de la phase I du projet de jumelage, incluant l'élaboration et le partage du matériel de renforcement des compétences existant sur l'efficacité énergétique et les frigorigènes à faible potentiel de réchauffement de la planète (PRP); a débuté la mise en œuvre de la phase II du projet, incluant une offre de formation et d'assistance pour les UNO désireuses de renforcer ou d'instaurer des politiques et des règlements visant à améliorer l'efficacité énergétique de l'équipement de RAC nouveau ou existant;
- i) Il a développé des produits régionaux et mondiaux de renforcement des compétences, incluant des fiches d'information, publications, applications et manuels de formation; géré le site Web d'OzonAction; diffusé 22 bulletins bimensuels d'OzoNews et trois éditions spéciales; soutenu 30 activités de sensibilisation du public, telles que les célébrations de la Journée mondiale de l'ozone, des ateliers, des tables rondes et des expositions technologiques itinérantes Ozone2Climate, et la Journée mondiale de la réfrigération;
- j) Il a appuyé la mise en œuvre de la politique du Fonds multilatéral sur l'égalité des genres dans les services et projets du PAC; soutenu les UNO, avec des outils et des ressources, pour les évaluations de la place réservée aux femmes; offert des opportunités de réseautage et de mentorat à travers le Réseau international des femmes dans le refroidissement (INWIC); soutenu des pays pour l'intégration d'activités relatives à l'égalité des genres dans les projets de plans de gestion de l'élimination des HCFC (PGEH) et de plans de mise en œuvre de l'Amendement de Kigali pour les HFC (KIP);
- k) Il a soutenu la préparation et la présentation des projets approuvés aux 95^e et 96^e réunions, incluant 34 tranches et nouvelles phases de PGEH, 40 rapports de vérification de PGEH, 28 KIP, 39 projets de renforcement des institutions, 20 préparations de projets, 20 composantes sur l'efficacité énergétique aux termes de la décision 89/6, un projet pilote aux termes de la décision 91/65, 35 projets concernant des inventaires et plans d'action pour les substances réglementées utilisées ou indésirables, conformément à la décision 91/66; et
- l) Il a soutenu la mise en œuvre de PGEH dans 102 pays (75 à titre d'agence principale, 27 à titre d'agence coopérante), de KIP dans 50 pays (32 à titre d'agence principale, 18 à titre d'agence coopérante), des projets sur l'efficacité énergétique dans 39 pays et des projets pour la préparation d'inventaires nationaux des substances réglementées utilisées ou indésirables et les plans d'action subséquents dans 51 pays.

Rapport sur l'appui technique et stratégique aux pays à faible volume de consommation pour soutenir la mise en œuvre des KIP

4. Par la décision 93/95d), le Comité exécutif a approuvé la hausse du budget du PAC pour les années 2024, 2025, et 2026 afin de fournir une assistance technique et stratégique aux pays à faible volume de consommation (PFV) pour appuyer la mise en œuvre des KIP, étant entendu notamment que le PNUE rendra compte des activités d'assistance technique et stratégique fournies aux PFV et de leurs répercussions dans le descriptif de leurs rapports périodiques annuels sur le PAC. À la 95^e réunion, le PNUE a rapporté qu'une assistance spéciale avait été fournie aux PFV dans quatre domaines prioritaires, sélectionnés en fonction de leur pertinence, impact potentiel et répliquabilité dans les divers contextes des PFV. Depuis le dernier rapport, le renforcement des capacités des UNO dans le secteur de la climatisation mobile en vue de prendre des mesures anticipées et d'évaluer les tendances de la consommation a été remplacé par une nouvelle priorité visant le développement de compétences pour le refroidissement sécuritaire et durable, par le renforcement de la sécurité au travail dans le secteur RAC. Le PNUE a l'intention de continuer à appuyer les PFV dans les quatre domaines prioritaires, incluant maintenant un nouveau, et d'embaucher des consultants pour

compléter l'expertise de l'équipe technique et stratégique du PNUE pour la mise en œuvre des KIP dans les PFV. En date de la préparation de ce rapport, le PNUE a indiqué que deux consultants avaient été embauchés à cet effet. Les activités suivantes ont été menées dans chacun des trois domaines prioritaires initiaux :

- a) *Renforcer la capacité des PFV à mettre en œuvre des systèmes de permis et de quotas pour les HFC et collecter des données sur les tendances de consommation des HFC* : le PNUE a sélectionné deux PFV pour des initiatives pilotes et embauché un consultant pour évaluer les systèmes de permis et de quotas pour les HFC, incluant les mécanismes de suivi et de communication des données, et analyser les tendances de consommation des HFC par rapport aux niveaux de référence des deux PFV sélectionnés, en se concentrant sur les facteurs sous-jacents des fluctuations dans les types de consommation, les besoins spécifiques du marché domestique, et les projections de la demande future. Les conclusions des deux évaluations permettront d'élaborer des fiches/du matériel d'information, dont une sur les méthodes utilisées pour l'analyse des tendances de consommation; ce matériel ainsi que les conclusions et résultats des évaluations seront diffusés à travers les réunions reliées au Protocole de Montréal;
- b) *Aider les UNO à identifier la consommation dans le sous-secteur de l'installation et l'assemblage au niveau local, et convertir les entreprises de ce sous-secteur à des solutions de remplacement à faible PRP par des activités n'impliquant aucun investissement* : Fournir des orientations et des ressources à tous les PFV, le PNUE a sélectionné le Zimbabwe pour un modèle d'activités pilotes répliquables. Une entente de financement à petite échelle a été signée et une réunion de coordination organisée avec l'association du Zimbabwe pour la réfrigération et la climatisation (HEVACRAZ). Une mission de terrain conjointe a été menée pour inspecter diverses entreprises d'installation et d'assemblage à travers le pays. Actuellement, le PNUE effectue une cartographie des parties prenantes et une analyse de l'état de préparation, incluant une évaluation de la législation, réglementation et des obstacles institutionnels dans le secteur de la réfrigération commerciale. Des préparatifs sont en cours pour une enquête sectorielle nationale sur l'utilisation des frigorigènes, l'accréditation des techniciens et la capacité à adopter des technologies à faible PRP. Ces activités soutiendront l'élaboration d'un rapport complet sur l'état de préparation qui intégrera une évaluation des compétences techniques et des lacunes en matière de politiques, ainsi qu'une cartographie de l'équipement et une analyse des faiblesses institutionnelles; l'élaboration d'un registre national des techniciens et d'activités incitatives pour renforcer la visibilité du secteur et promouvoir l'adoption de technologies à faible PRP; fourniront une trousse pratique pour la réfrigération commerciale, incluant un logiciel de calibrage, des listes de vérification techniques, et du matériel d'orientation connexe; et encourageront l'implication du secteur par du matériel de sensibilisation ciblé et des ressources de formation, avec du contenu conçu pour être adaptable et répliquable dans d'autres PFV; et
- c) *Formation du personnel du PAC sur l'efficacité énergétique et les NMPE* : Des représentants de la région Amérique latine du PAC ont participé à une formation réunissant des parties prenantes pour explorer les politiques d'efficacité énergétique dans la région. Les participants ont découvert les multiples avantages de l'efficacité énergétique, incluant le développement économique, l'amélioration de la santé publique et la réduction des émissions de gaz à effet de serre; diverses options de politique d'efficacité énergétique; exploré l'efficacité énergétique dans les appareils et équipements, incluant le potentiel d'une harmonisation des normes, de programmes d'étiquetage et d'initiatives de transformation du marché pour améliorer la performance énergétique. Le personnel du PAC de la région Asie-Pacifique devrait participer à une formation spécialisée sur l'efficacité énergétique en décembre 2025.

Programme de travail du PAC pour 2026

5. Le plan de travail de 2026 a été élaboré dans le contexte de la stratégie de 2024-2026, énoncée dans la décision 93/91a). Le PNUE mettra en œuvre les activités suivantes pour soutenir les résultats identifiés dans le cadre la stratégie triennale et plus particulièrement ceux pour 2026, tels que présentés dans le plan de travail complet contenu dans la partie I de la demande jointe :

- a) Continuer à fournir une assistance technique pour la surveillance, les rapports et la mise en œuvre des projets de renforcement des institutions, et, sur demande, une assistance spécifique aux pays visés à l'article 5 pour des questions techniques, stratégiques ou opérationnelles précises; organiser des réunions de réseau dans les 10 régions pour traiter de questions prioritaires à la demande des pays membres du réseau, échanger de l'information et partager des expériences; continuer à former tous les nouveaux NOO et les assistants pour une gestion efficace des programmes nationaux de conformité et offrir une formation avancée aux administrateurs intéressés en vue d'améliorer la gestion des UNO;
- b) Continuer à aider les UNO intéressées pour faciliter la compréhension de la méthodologie de création des inventaires des banques de substances réglementées utilisées ou indésirables et l'identification de stratégies potentielles et de modèles d'affaire pour la gestion de leur fin de vie; encourager les activités de pays à pays pour répondre à des besoins particuliers et promouvoir une coopération Sud-Sud/Nord-Sud; et soutenir les UNO dans l'exploration de synergies reliées à la mise en œuvre de l'Amendement de Kigali;
- c) Surveiller et soutenir les exigences de rapport sur les données, et soutenir les UNO dans l'utilisation des systèmes de rapport en ligne; continuer à soutenir les pays visés à l'article 5 dans l'identification et l'adoption de pratiques exemplaires pour la collecte des données, la contre-vérification, le rapprochement et les rapports, notamment pour les HFC; aider les UNO à comprendre le calcul des valeurs de référence pour les HFC et les points de départ des réductions globales durables; fournir des orientations sur l'établissement des valeurs de référence des HFC et surveiller la conformité à la mesure réglementaire de gel de 2024;
- d) Continuer à aider les pays visés à l'article 5 dans l'élaboration, la révision et la mise en œuvre de politiques, lois et règlements, incluant ceux relatifs aux systèmes de permis et de quotas, et l'amélioration de la surveillance, des rapports, de la vérification, et de l'application des règlements sur les HCFC et HFC; continuer à promouvoir les outils existants (par ex., manuel sur la communication des données, consentement préalable éclairé informel, calculateurs de quotas) et l'adoption de systèmes de permis électroniques; aider les pays visés à l'article 5 qui n'ont pas encore ratifié l'Amendement de Kigali et ce faisant, soutenir les pays du Groupe 2 pour l'introduction de systèmes de permis et de quotas pour les HFC; encourager des politiques sur l'extinction des incendies et la gestion du cycle de vie des frigorigènes;
- e) Continuer à mobiliser les autorités douanières et d'application de la loi pour intégrer le travail relié au Protocole de Montréal dans leurs opérations et promouvoir l'utilisation des outils et du matériel numériques développés par le PNUE et ses partenaires (par ex., les systèmes de suivi électronique, les bases de données partagées pour l'application de la loi, le système de douanes à guichet unique, l'application Desktop Tracker pour les quotas et permis de HCFC); soutenir la formation des agents d'application de la loi, la collaboration transfrontalière, le dialogue et le partage de données, et la coopération avec les courtiers en douanes pour la classification correcte des frigorigènes; encourager toutes les UNO à institutionaliser la coopération avec les autorités douanières; soutenir les UNO intéressées à travailler avec les autorités douanières pour promouvoir l'adoption et/ou la mise en œuvre des codes du Système harmonisé de 2022 (HS) ou des codes régionaux, sous-codes

nationaux ou autres mesures pour faciliter la surveillance des importations et exportations individuelles de HFC; aider une organisation régionale et sous-régionale et les autorités douanières nationales intéressées à évaluer et aligner leurs systèmes nationaux de tarifs avec le code individuel du HS pour les HFC dans le cadre du système de codes HS de 2027; encourager les UNO à participer au programme de l'OMD sur le trafic transfrontalier de déchets et de substances appauvrissant la couche d'ozone; élaborer et diffuser une trousse d'application de la loi, un guide de lutte contre le commerce illicite et un rapport sur les tendances récentes du commerce illicite;

- f) Continuer à mettre en œuvre les activités du centre d'échange mondial, notamment par la préparation et la diffusion de matériel d'information et d'éducation ciblé, de services destinés aux parties prenantes, en format numérique et papier, la publication de notes sur les technologies et les frigorigènes de remplacement; la gestion du site Web OzonAction et du portail des réunions; la diffusion de la publication bimensuelle d'OzoNews et de trois publications thématiques d'OzonAction Scoop; promouvoir le soutien du Protocole de Montréal par des activités régionales de sensibilisation adoptées par les pays lors des réunions de réseau; et encourager les UNO et les autorités douanières à participer à la Journée mondiale de l'ozone, la Journée mondiale de la réfrigération, et la Journée mondiale des douanes pour promouvoir les objectifs du Protocole de Montréal et faire connaître le travail de surveillance et d'application de la loi;
- g) Soutenir toutes les UNO par de la formation dans le secteur de l'entretien de l'équipement de réfrigération, en fournissant du matériel de formation et de l'information sur les frigorigènes et les technologies de remplacement, la saine gestion des frigorigènes, des directives et des normes sur leur utilisation sécuritaire et responsable, et le secteur de l'installation et de l'assemblage au niveau local; remettre à toutes les UNO des programmes de formation actualisés pour les techniciens d'entretien afin de soutenir les activités de formation de leurs PGEH et KIP; aider les universités intéressées à intégrer des cours de gestion des frigorigènes dans leurs programmes de formation des ingénieurs; aider les UNO à coopérer avec les autorités responsables de la formation technique professionnelle pour de la formation dans le secteur de l'entretien de l'équipement de RAC et à renforcer leurs associations nationales de RAC; orienter les UNO vers des applications de niche consommant des HFC et l'instauration/amélioration de programmes d'accréditation des techniciens; promouvoir des tables rondes et des expositions technologiques itinérantes; continuer à soutenir la capacité des UNO en matière de HFC et de solutions de remplacement utilisées dans les secteurs de la climatisation mobile et de la chaîne du froid; et développer du matériel pour les techniciens du secteur informel;
- h) Poursuivre la mise en œuvre de la phase II du projet de jumelage des NOO et des décideurs en matière de politique d'efficacité énergétique et faire le suivi des recommandations de la phase I; élaborer et/ou partager du matériel de renforcement des compétences sur l'efficacité énergétique et les frigorigènes à faible PRP; continuer à offrir aux techniciens des programmes de formation actualisés sur l'installation et l'entretien de l'équipement de RAC écoénergétique, et soutenir les UNO dans l'instauration de politiques ou règlements pour améliorer l'efficacité énergétique de l'équipement de RAC, incluant des politiques d'approvisionnement pour les appareils de RAC écoénergétiques et des bases de données sur la performance énergétique des appareils de RAC;
- i) S'assurer que tous les projets du Fonds multilatéral mis en œuvre par le PNUE incluent des composantes sur l'égalité des genres, soutiennent les UNO pour effectuer les évaluations de l'égalité des genres conformément à la politique du Fonds à cet égard; encourager et assister toutes les UNO pour promouvoir la participation des femmes dans le secteur RAC grâce à de la sensibilisation, de l'information et de la formation; continuer d'inclure l'égalité des

genres dans le contexte des programmes nationaux, projets et activités du Protocole de Montréal, et comme sujet dans les réunions de réseaux régionaux; et fournir des opportunités de réseautage et de mentorat à travers l'INWIC; et

- j) Continuer de soutenir la préparation de projet, la présentation et la mise en œuvre de PGEH, KIP et activités supplémentaires dans les PGEH pour maintenir l'efficacité dans le secteur de l'entretien de l'équipement de réfrigération; des projets pilotes pour maintenir et/ou améliorer l'efficacité énergétique des technologies de remplacement et de l'équipement dans le contexte de la réduction progressive des HFC; des projets pour soutenir la préparation des inventaires nationaux des banques de substances réglementées utilisées ou indésirables et la préparation des rapports de vérification; poursuivre les activités dans les domaines prioritaires afin d'apporter un soutien additionnel aux PFV.

Appui technique et stratégique aux pays à faible volume de consommation pour soutenir la mise en œuvre des KIP en 2026

6. En 2026, le PNUE utilisera l'assistance spéciale pour soutenir les PFV, qui ont des KIP approuvés, dans la phase de mise en œuvre ainsi que ceux dont les KIP seront présentés aux 97^e et 98^e réunions pour examen par le Comité exécutif. Cela se fera à travers les activités existantes dans les trois domaines identifiés initialement comme prioritaires et dans le nouveau domaine ajouté, et par l'embauche d'un consultant supplémentaire pour compléter le soutien technique et stratégique de l'équipe du PAC pour les PFV afin de soutenir la mise en œuvre des KIP. On s'attend aussi à ce que les autres équipes du PAC (à savoir, Afrique, Asie de l'Ouest, Europe et Asie centrale, et PAC mondial) soient formées en matière d'efficacité énergétique en 2026, selon la disponibilité de programmes de formation spécialisée pertinents. Dans le cadre du rapport périodique du PAC en 2026, le PNUE fournira un résumé préliminaire des réalisations durant les deux premières années de ces allocations supplémentaires spéciales.

7. Le nouveau domaine prioritaire sur le refroidissement sécuritaire et durable par le renforcement de la sécurité au travail dans le secteur RAC, est considéré comme critique par le PNUE pour de nombreux PFV où la transition vers des frigorigènes à faible PRP présente des défis environnementaux et en matière de sécurité en raison de la capacité technique limitée, de l'application des règlements et de l'accès à des technologies sécuritaires. Cette initiative est actuellement au stade de la formulation et devrait être mise en œuvre en quatre phases qui incluront la sélection de pays pilotes et l'évaluation des politiques nationales par rapport aux normes internationales de sécurité afin d'identifier les lacunes réglementaires; l'élaboration de matériel de formation culturellement adéquat, tel que des étiquettes d'avertissement imagées, des outils de travail et des brochures illustrées, et leur diffusion via WhatsApp ou des radios communautaires; la création d'une app mobile "Safety-Scan" pour aider les techniciens à évaluer les risques en temps réel et soutenir la collecte de données et la surveillance; et l'intégration des leçons tirées dans les politiques nationales, incluant l'adoption de règlements de santé et sécurité au travail dans les KIP nationaux, alignés sur Kigali.

Changements dans le budget du PAC de 2026

8. Le budget du PAC proposé pour 2026, au montant de 11 276 967 \$US, plus des coûts d'appui d'agence de 902 157 \$US (8 pour cent), est contenu dans la partie III de la demande jointe. Le budget global du PAC inclut l'allocation supplémentaire de 150 000 \$US selon la décision 93/95 (ligne budgétaire 3216) pour le soutien technique et stratégique des PFV afin de soutenir la mise en œuvre des KIP. Le budget total dépasse de 0,77 pour cent le budget approuvé en 2025 (soit 11 191 331 \$US, incluant aussi l'allocation supplémentaire de 150 000 \$US selon la décision 93/95, plus les coûts d'appui d'agence). Le budget proposé est inférieur à la hausse budgétaire maximale annuelle de 3 pour cent, autorisée par la décision 47/24a)iii).³

Changements dans le budget des programmes⁴

9. Dans les lignes des activités, le budget proposé est basé sur un scénario de croissance zéro. Le budget propose une hausse de 3,00 pour cent pour les lignes du personnel afin de couvrir essentiellement les coûts inflationnaires des postes comblés, une diminution de 0,70 pour cent des coûts de déplacements, une hausse de 0,30 pour cent des coûts d'activités régionales et de réunions, et une diminution de 17,54 pour cent des coûts des services mondiaux et de consultation.

Changements dans le budget du personnel du PAC⁵

10. Le PNUE a basé sa demande pour le budget du personnel en 2026 sur le coût des postes comblés en 2025, plus un ajustement de 3,00 pour cent pour l'inflation. Pour les postes vacants, le PNUE a utilisé les coûts standard officiels de l'ONU en 2025. Le PNUE ne propose aucun changement aux lignes budgétaires du personnel pour 2026. Selon les instructions internes sur la gestion budgétaire prudente et la résilience organisationnelle, à partir du 21 février 2025, toutes les offres d'emploi du PNUE pour des postes d'un an ou plus sont annoncées comme engagement d'une durée déterminée, limité à un an, et tous les emplois à OzonAction sont des postes à durée déterminée et assujettis désormais à des renouvellements pour un maximum d'un an.

Services mondiaux de consultation

11. La réduction dans les services mondiaux est due à l'allocation exceptionnelle de 150 000 \$US dans le budget de 2025 (ligne budgétaire 3213) pour embaucher des experts de l'efficacité énergétique afin de soutenir les pays visés à l'article 5 dans la présentation de projets liés à l'efficacité énergétique dans le cadre des décisions pertinentes du Comité exécutif. Le renouvellement de cette ligne budgétaire n'a pas été demandé pour 2026. Cette allocation était prévue à court terme et serait réexaminée dans les budgets subséquents du PAC.

Déplacements, activités et réunions régionales, locaux et équipements

12. Le budget pour ces composantes est basé sur un scénario de croissance zéro, avec des ajustements mineurs, à savoir une diminution de 4 000 \$US dans le budget des déplacements (0,70 pour cent) et une hausse de 4 000 \$US pour les coûts d'activités et de réunions (0,30 pour cent), qui se compensent.⁶

Comparaison du budget pour 2024-2026

13. Selon la décision 95/83c)iv),⁷ le PNUE a fourni une comparaison du budget du PAC sur trois ans, tel qu'indiqué dans le tableau 1 ci-dessous.

14. Les soldes du PAC de 2024, au montant de 1 336 306 \$US, plus des coûts d'appui d'agence de 106 904 \$US, sont restitués à la 97^e réunion. La plupart des soldes restitués concernaient les lignes budgétaires du personnel pour des postes vacants durant une partie ou la totalité de l'année.

OBSERVATIONS ET RECOMMANDATION DU SECRÉTARIAT

OBSERVATIONS

15. Le Secrétariat a examiné la demande pour le budget du PAC et les changements dans les coûts de programme et de personnel, conformément à la décision 95/83c)⁸, en tenant compte de la structure globale du PAC, de ses opérations, de la structure régionale et autres décisions pertinentes.

16. Le Secrétariat a demandé si le PNUE avait envisagé de tenir de vastes consultations en 2026, dernière année de la stratégie du PAC pour la période 2024-2026, de mener un examen approfondi de la stratégie actuelle durant l'élaboration de la stratégie pour la période 2027-2029 avec des activités remaniées. Le PNUE a indiqué qu'à l'approche de la dernière année de la stratégie du PAC pour la période 2024-2026, UNEP OzonAction mènerait des consultations avec les parties prenantes clés en 2026, pour recueillir leurs commentaires sur la meilleure façon de répondre aux besoins des pays visés à l'article 5 et mener une réflexion sur les leçons tirées et sur des approches innovantes.

17. Lors de l'examen de la proposition, le Secrétariat a constaté que l'activité visant l'élaboration d'une formation pilote courte destinée aux NOO sur les compétences de négociations pour une participation

efficace aux réunions du Protocole de Montréal et du Fonds multilatéral, incluse dans le plan de travail de 2025, se retrouvait dans le plan de travail de 2026. Le PNUE a expliqué qu'avec l'arrivée du directeur du renforcement des compétences à OzonAction en février 2025, du matériel de formation a été préparé et la formation pilote est prévue pour 2026. Il a ajouté que plusieurs régions et pays ont fait part de leur intérêt pour cette formation pilote.

18. À la question du Secrétariat sur la manière dont le PAC soutient le renforcement de la collecte et de l'analyse des données, le PNUE a répondu que la fiabilité des données est un point récurrent à l'ordre du jour des réunions des réseaux régionaux. Le soutien apporté aux pays pour la tenue des enquêtes sur les solutions de remplacement des SAO et celles requises pour la préparation des KIP, a amélioré l'exactitude des données. Du matériel d'orientation sur les méthodes de collecte et d'analyse des données, ainsi que des questionnaires standard, ont été préparés et distribués aux pays à travers les réseaux. OzonAction a développé une trousse de préparation du KIP qui inclut une liste de vérification pour soutenir les experts et les UNO dans la collecte des données. Pour renforcer les compétences de collecte et d'analyse des données, des experts nationaux et régionaux ont participé aussi à des sessions dédiées au renforcement des compétences. Le PAC a compilé un rapport résumant les activités incluses dans les KIP soumis et continuera de mettre à jour ce résumé au fur et à mesure de l'approbation des KIP. En outre, le PNUE soutient les UNO à travers la mise en œuvre des projets de renforcement des institutions, une formation adaptée pour les nouveaux NOO et de l'assistance technique est offerte aussi pour répondre à des besoins particuliers des pays, incluant le rapprochement des données provenant de sources différentes afin de produire un seul ensemble exact de données aux fins de rapport.

19. En réponse à la question du Secrétariat sur la manière dont le PAC soutient les UNO qui souhaitent actualiser leurs cadres juridiques nationaux du Protocole de Montréal, et obtenir un soutien consultatif pour rédiger ou amender des lois et des règlements, le PNUE a indiqué qu'OzonAction a un partenariat avec le MELP (Montevideo Environmental Law Programme) dans le cadre de la Division du droit du PNUE pour fournir un soutien juridique spécialisé aux pays visés à l'article 5. L'équipe du MELP inclut des experts en droit de l'environnement qui, en collaboration avec l'expertise technique des équipes régionales du PAC, soutiennent les UNO pour rédiger et amender les cadres juridiques et réglementaires nécessaires pour la conformité au Protocole de Montréal et pour la mise en œuvre.

20. Le Secrétariat a posé des questions sur l'état du projet de Stratégie de communication mondiale pour soutenir la conformité au Protocole de Montréal et à l'Amendement de Kigali. Le PNUE a indiqué qu'elle avait été élaborée tout au long de 2025 et qu'elle faisait l'objet d'ajustements à la suite des consultations tenues. On s'attend à ce qu'elle soit finalisée d'ici la fin de 2025.

21. Concernant le budget proposé pour 2026, le Secrétariat a posé une question sur les postes non pourvus. Le PNUE a expliqué qu'il y avait six postes dont trois sont rendus à un stade avancé du processus de recrutement et tous les processus internes devraient être complétés durant les premières semaines de décembre tandis que le recrutement pour les trois autres postes a débuté et se poursuit.

22. En examinant le budget du PAC proposé pour 2026 par rapport au budget approuvé de 2025, le Secrétariat a observé que le financement supplémentaire inclus dans le budget en 2025 pour embaucher des experts de l'efficacité énergétique afin de soutenir les pays visés à l'article 5 n'avait pas été inclus dans la proposition de 2026. Le Secrétariat a donc demandé un rapport sur les résultats obtenus avec les fonds supplémentaires (150 000 \$US), approuvés dans le budget de 2025 à la ligne sur les services mondiaux. Le PNUE a indiqué que le financement n'avait pas encore été alloué pour un soutien centralisé ou régional des projets d'efficacité énergétique en raison d'autres considérations de programme et que des consultations avec les équipes régionales du PAC étaient en cours afin d'engager le financement avant la 97^e réunion. Tout financement non engagé d'ici la fin de 2025 sera restitué au Fonds multilatéral, selon la pratique normale. Le Tableau 2 présente une comparaison entre le budget approuvé de 2025 et le budget proposé pour 2026.

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INTRODUCTION

1. In its capacity as an Implementing Agency of the Multilateral Fund for the Implementation of the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer, UN Environment Programme (UNEP) is submitting this document for the consideration of the Executive Committee at its 97th meeting. The document comprises:

- Part I: 2026 CAP Workplan.
- Part II: Highlights of 2025 CAP Progress Report.
- Part III: 2026 CAP Budget.
- Annexes.

PART I: 2026 CAP WORKPLAN

Context of the 2024-2026 CAP Strategy

2. The proposed 2026 Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP) Workplan and Budget has been developed in the context of UNEP's 2024-2026 CAP Strategy, which was noted by the Executive Committee at its 93rd meeting through Decision 93/91(a).¹ The strategy sets the overall vision and direction for UNEP in its capacity as an Implementing Agency of the Multilateral Fund during this three-year period. UNEP developed the strategy based on the current and anticipated needs of countries operating under Article 5 of the Montreal Protocol that have been identified from various sources and through consultations and interactions with concerned stakeholders. The strategy follows UNEP's Results Based Management approach.

3. UNEP's work under the Multilateral Fund revolves around certain major thematic areas that are critical for Article 5 countries with respect to their Montreal Protocol obligations and which relate to UNEP's specific mandate. When UNEP became an Implementing Agency on 19 June 1991, the Executive Committee entrusted UNEP with:

- Political promotion of the objectives of the Protocol.
- Research and data gathering, according to the provisions of the Protocol.
- Assistance in Clearinghouse functions as per Article 10 (3)(b) of the Montreal Protocol.²

4. UNEP fulfills this mandate through the Law Division's OzonAction Branch. The discharge of this mandate contributes directly or indirectly to UNEP's 2022-2025 Medium Term Strategy (MTS), which

focusses on three interconnected planetary crises – climate change, biodiversity loss and pollution.³ The MTS employs seven interlinked sub-programmes for action: Climate Action, Chemicals and Pollutions Action, Nature Action, Science Policy, Environmental Governance, Finance and Economic Transformations and Digital Transformations. Most of UNEP’s work under the Multilateral Fund falls under the Environmental Governance sub-programme, although some of it contributes to Climate Action as well.

5. UNEP's mission is to enable developing countries to meet and sustain their compliance obligations under the Montreal Protocol, which include several critical compliance milestones during the 2024-2026 period covered by the strategy.

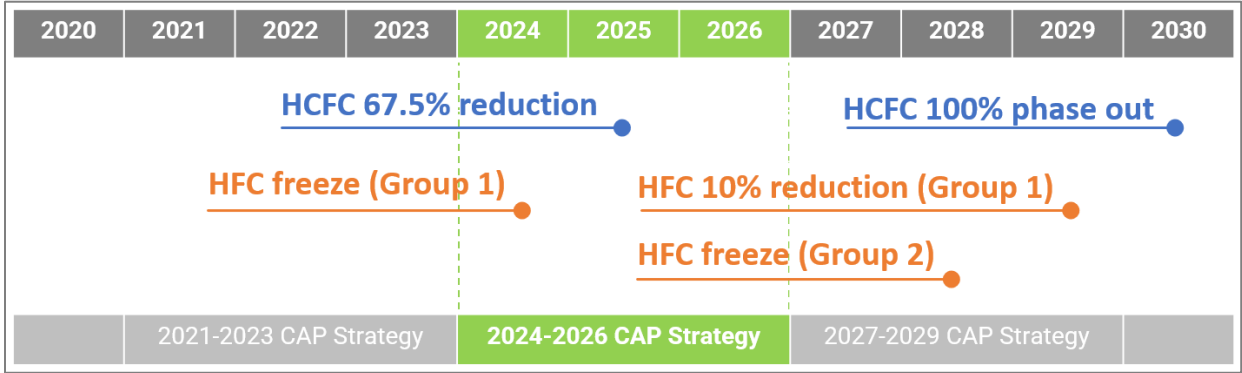


Figure 1. Milestones for Article 5 countries during the period covered by the 2024-2026 CAP Strategy.

2026 Workplan

11. This workplan proposes outputs that support the achievement of these outcomes. Through the implementation of this workplan, UNEP will continue using its comparative advantages to effectively assist Article 5 countries to meet and sustain compliance with their commitments under the Montreal Protocol and its Amendments. Note: The specific indicators for each of the following activities are presented in Annex 1 – Logical Framework Analysis for 2026.

OUTCOME 1
National Ozone Units effectively manage their national programmes

12. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:
- Provide all Article 5 countries with IS projects approved for UNEP implementation with technical assistance to expedite the preparation, implementation, monitoring and reporting of IS phases as per Annex 2.

- Provide support to any NOU requesting region- and country-specific compliance assistance needed to address specific technical, policy, or operational issues as per Annex 3, or as per ad hoc requests.
- Organise Regional Network meetings for Ozone Officers in all ten regions, including physical and/or online regional, sub-regional, inter-regional, and/or thematic meetings, so that all Ozone Officers and/or their assistants and key stakeholders can learn from peer-to-peer interaction and strengthen cooperation at the regional and international levels.
- Offer introductory training to all new Ozone Officers and/or their assistants to provide them with the basic skills, competencies and understanding of the Montreal Protocol and Multilateral Fund needed to effectively manage their national compliance programmes and projects.
- Offer advanced training to interested Ozone Officers to acquire advanced skills to further enhance her/his management of their NOUs.
- Develop and pilot a short training course for Ozone Officers on effective participation and negotiations in Montreal Protocol and Multilateral Fund meetings.
- Support NOUs requesting or needing specific support through country-to-country (south-south/north-south) cooperation facilitated by CAP, e.g., NOU-NOU meetings, study tours, technology roundtables.
- Assist NOUs to explore synergies related to Kigali Amendment objectives with national energy efficiency policies and financial mechanisms.

OUTCOME 2

Article 5 countries report accurate and timely data

13. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

- Regularly monitor the status of Article 7 and Country Programme data reporting to identify and avoid late submissions or risks of non-compliance and follow-up as needed with respect to the data reporting deadlines.
- Assist any NOUs requesting support with reviewing and/or reporting accurate Article 7 and/or Country Programme data and ensuring consistency between those two data sets.
- Assist all NOUs to understand and use the new online reporting systems for Article 7 and Country Programme data.
- Make all NOUs aware of best practices and methodologies for data collection, cross-checking and reporting requirements for all controlled substances and encourage the institutionalization of those processes.
- Encourage all NOUs to identify and analyse differences between their country's reported trade data and those reported by other countries with whom they trade and to resolve any inconsistencies with their counterparts, including assisting the NOUs with understanding the annual aggregated export data provided by the Ozone Secretariat.
- Offer interested NOUs guidance for establishment of their HFC baselines and starting points for sustained aggregate reductions in HFC consumption.
- Provide assistance to interested NOUs in Group 2 Article 5 countries with the establishment of their baselines and issues related to HFC data reporting.

- Regularly analyse HFC data for compliance with the 2024 freeze control measure to identify necessary actions needed to avoid potential non-compliance.

OUTCOME 3
Effective legal, regulatory and policy frameworks are in place and enforced

14. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

- Inform all NOUs about options, including best practices and preventative approaches involving awareness and education, to enhance their national Montreal Protocol monitoring, reporting, verification and enforcement (MRVE) systems.
- Assist all NOUs of Group 1 Article 5 Parties to the Kigali Amendment which have not yet established their HFC licensing systems, as well as NOUs in Group 2 countries, with the establishment of their HFC licensing systems.
- Assist all NOUs with existing HCFC and HFC licensing systems to operate, strengthen and/or enforce them.
- Assist all NOUs to design, establish and/or enforce their HFC quota systems.
- In collaboration with the Ozone Secretariat, assist all NOUs in Article 5 countries that have not yet ratified the Kigali Amendment to do so, including those in Group 2, to achieve universal ratification by the time of the Amendment's 10th anniversary in 2026.
- Provide guidance to all NOUs about the approaches, benefits, and best practices for electronic licensing systems to control HCFCs and HFCs.
- Assist NOUs already participating in the informal Prior Informed Consent (iPIC) mechanism to use it effectively to support enforcement of their licensing and quota systems, encourage more countries to join, and improve the system based on user feedback.
- Support interested NOUs with updating their national Montreal Protocol legal frameworks (e.g. standards, energy efficiency, illegal trade, HFCs, etc.) and provide technical/legal advisory support to draft or amend laws and regulations in cooperation with *inter alia* UNEP's Montevideo Environmental Law Programme.

OUTCOME 4
Imports and exports are controlled, and illegal trade is reduced/prevented

15. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

- Assist all NOUs requesting support to update, monitor or enforce their national regulations and policies to facilitate and monitor legal trade in controlled substances and to combat illegal trade through an integrated approach.
- Provide all NOUs with tools developed by UNEP and its partners for use in the delivery of their national Customs training, and, as appropriate, training of environmental inspectors and other law enforcement officers.
- Increase the awareness and understanding of all NOUs about critical Montreal Protocol customs issues, including best practices, risk profiling, second-hand or obsolete equipment imports, innovative approaches and ways to combat illegal trade in controlled substances.

- Encourage all NOUs through Regional Network meetings to explore the use of digital tools for enhanced customs and enforcement work such as Single Window, electronic tracking systems, e-licensing platforms, or shared enforcement databases.
- Make all NOUs aware of methods that support enforcement of national licensing systems, both at and beyond the Customs check point in domestic markets, including market surveillance and facility inspections.
- Facilitate cross-border coordination, dialogue and data sharing between interested NOUs, Customs agencies, and enforcement authorities for enhanced detection, prevention, and reporting of illegal trade in controlled substances.
- Encourage all NOUs to institutionalize cooperation with Customs Authorities, possibly through signing MoUs, and interact more closely with Customs agencies to promote regional and international action to combat illegal trade.
- Encourage and assist interested national Customs training academies to adopt the UNEP-WCO Customs Training Manual into their national curricula.
- Develop and disseminate an Enforcement Toolkit to be complemented with additional enforcement related themes and interactive exercises.
- Develop a guide on approaches for combatting illegal trade of controlled substances via online marketplaces and the feasibility of using artificial intelligence to identify such potentially illegal offers.
- Develop a report on the extent of illegal trade and its recent trends in cooperation with partner organizations.
- Assist interested NOUs to work with Customs to promote the adoption and/or implementation of the 2022 Harmonized System codes or otherwise adopt regional codes, national subcodes or other measures to facilitate the monitoring of individual HFC substances imports and exports.
- Collaborate with interested regional and/or sub-regional organization and national customs authority in identification of existing national tariff system to accommodate individual Harmonized System (HS) code for HFCs under 2027 HS code system.
- Support NOUs to strengthen inter-agency cooperation on enforcement issues through their customs and law enforcement participation in global enforcement operations, e.g. *Operation Demeter* coordinated by WCO and *Custos Viridis* coordinated by Europol.
- Encourage all NOUs to work with Customs brokers on the proper classification of refrigerants and their products, to improve data collection, verification reporting and border control.
- Strengthen collaboration with actors involved in the enforcement chain at the global, regional and national levels (e.g., Interpol, Europol, UNODC, and actors such as police, port authorities, environmental inspectors, prosecutors, judges), explore strategies for effectively combating illegal trade (e.g., awareness raising activities for prosecutors) and links to other crimes (e.g., corruption, tax invasion).
- Promote the concept of Green Customs and include related sessions in selected enforcement meetings.

OUTCOME 5

Key stakeholders and the public enthusiastically support national compliance programmes

16. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

- Prepare and disseminate targeted information, communications and educational materials and services to ensure that NOUs, key stakeholders and the public are well informed about priority topics related to the Montreal Protocol through digital and print media.
- Promote public support for the Montreal Protocol at the regional level through awareness activities agreed by the Regional Network members.
- Outreach Montreal Protocol issues at key international, regional, and national forums including those related to Montreal Protocol and climate.
- Maintain and enhance the OzonAction website (www.unep.org/ozonaction) and OzonAction Meeting Portal (www.ozonactionmeetings.org).
- Update the online OzonAction Knowledge Maps to provide NOUs and other stakeholders with access to key and recent data to support Montreal Protocol implementation.
- Produce and disseminate the OzoNews service on a bi-weekly basis.
- Produce and disseminate the OzonAction Scoop on topical subjects three times per year.
- Encourage and support national celebrations of World Ozone Day (WOD) on 16 September, including the development of specific materials.
- Encourage and support celebrations of World Refrigeration Day (WRD) on 26 June, in cooperation with the WRD Secretariat and refrigeration and air conditioning partners to promote Montreal Protocol objectives to policymakers and the public.
- Encourage NOUs and their customs authorities to participate in World Customs Day (WCD) on January 26 to showcase their joint work under the Montreal Protocol to monitor and control trade of controlled substances and combat illegal trade.
- Translate prioritised publications and tools into UN languages, depending on regional priorities and available resources.
- Implement a Global Communication Strategy to support compliance with the Montreal Protocol and Kigali Amendment.

OUTCOME 6

Non-ODS, low-GWP technology is adopted and used safely, and servicing sector workforce skills are strengthened

17. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

- Provide all NOUs with key information to make informed choices related to the refrigeration servicing sector, including up-to-date information on sound refrigerant management, alternative low- GWP refrigerants, guidelines and standards for their safe and responsible use, information on technologies including not-in-kind, and the installation and assembly sector.
- Provide all NOUs with updated training curriculum for servicing technicians to support their HPMP and KIP training activities to promote the sound and safe handling of refrigerants, minimization of leaks, and maintenance/enhancement of energy efficiency of RAC appliances.
- Assist interested universities to integrate the updated University Course-Refrigerant Management for Future Engineers into their engineering curriculum.

- Encourage and assist all NOUs to increase their cooperation with their Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) authorities with respect to RAC servicing sector training and certification programs.
- Provide interested NOUs with information and technical and policy assistance for developing national RAC certification programs.
- Develop easy to understand materials promoting safe and best practices for technicians working in the informal sector.
- Provide interested NOUs with guidance for the establishment and/or improvement of national certification systems using materials and lessons learned from the development of the Refrigerant Driving License (RDL) global qualification program.
- Encourage interested NOUs to strengthen their national/regional RAC associations, encourage them to interact regularly with their associations, and exchange best practices so that the associations have increased engagement in their countries' national Montreal Protocol activities.
- Encourage interested NOUs to provide increased attention to the food cold chain sector and to strengthen their cooperation with stakeholders in that sector.
- Support all NOUs to have an increased understanding of the technical and regulatory issues related to HFCs and alternatives used in mobile air conditioning (MAC).
- Support all NOUs to have an increased understanding of the certain niche applications consuming HFCs (e.g. hair removal).
- Promote Ozone2Climate roundtables and road shows in interested regions and countries.

OUTCOME 7

Energy efficiency is maintained or increased in the RAC sector

18. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

- Encourage interested NOUs to interact with their national energy efficiency policy makers and identify areas of cooperation to promote energy efficiency during the HFC phase-down.
- Follow up on the recommendations from Phase I (2023-2024) of the Ozone Officers-Energy Efficiency Policymakers Twinning project and begin implementing Phase II (2025–2027), including the development and dissemination of new capacity building materials.
- Provide all NOUs with updated technician training curricula on how to maintain energy efficiency of existing RAC equipment through best installation and servicing practices.
- Provide all NOUs with guidance on legislative and policy options to maintain and/or enhance energy efficiency of existing and new RAC equipment.
- Assist interested NOUs with the review of existing registration and approval procedures for RAC appliances from the energy efficiency and refrigerant perspectives and streamline registration/approval procedures to enable the countries to have databases for both refrigerant and energy performance of RAC appliance.
- Assist interested NOUs with the development of national procurement and development assistance policies for compliant RAC appliances/integration of high energy efficient and low GWP RAC appliances in the existing building codes.

- Decision 96/51: Provide all NOUs with information and experiences about the pilot projects on energy-efficiency revolving funds for end users through Implementing Agency presentations during Regional Network meetings.

OUTCOME 8

Gender issues and approaches are considered and addressed in Montreal Protocol programmes and projects

19. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

- Ensure that all UNEP-implemented Multilateral Fund projects include gender components.
- Assist NOUs to complete gender assessment as required by the Multilateral Fund's Gender Policy by providing a methodology and tools.
- Assist NOUs to identify the entry point to integrate gender into implementation workstreams of the Montreal Protocol.
- Provide all NOUs with Regional Network meetings to use as a forum when requested to further consider gender in the context of their national Montreal Protocol programmes, projects and activities.
- Offer interested women working in the RAC sector in Article 5 countries networking and mentorship opportunities through the International Network of Women in Cooling (INWIC), and assist interested countries to incorporate those activities into HPMP and KIP projects.
- Encourage and assist all NOUs to promote the participation and inclusion of women in the RAC sector and customs through awareness raising, information and training provided by CAP.

CONTRIBUTING TO ACHIEVING ALL OUTCOMES

Article 5 countries meet their commitments through effective and timely implementation of Multilateral Fund projects

20. UNEP will deliver the following activities in 2026 to help achieve this outcome:

HCFC phase out

- Support all Article 5 countries requesting UNEP assistance to prepare, submit and implement HPMP stages or tranches as Lead or Cooperating Agency, ensuring consistency of the project, Article 7 and Country Programme data sets.
- Assist all Article 5 countries with HPMP verification projects approved for UNEP implementation to have their HCFC consumption verified in a timely and effective manner and help them implement the recommendations in the verification reports.

HFC phase down

- Support all Article 5 countries requesting UNEP assistance, including those of Group 2, to prepare, submit and implement KIPs as Lead or Cooperating Agency, ensuring consistency of the project, Article 7 and Country Programme data sets.

Unwanted controlled substances

- Decision 91/66: Assist all Article 5 countries with inventory of banks of used or unwanted controlled substances projects approved for UNEP implementation to implement them in a timely and effective manner.

Energy efficiency projects

- Decision 89/6(b): Support all LVCs requesting UNEP assistance to prepare, submit and implement additional activities in their HPMPs under the special funding window to maintain energy efficiency in the refrigeration servicing sector.
- Decisions 91/65 and 94/60: Support all Article 5 countries requesting UNEP assistance to prepare, submit and implement pilot projects to maintain and/or enhance energy efficiency of replacement technologies and equipment in the context of HFC phase-down.

Additional support to LVCs in 2026

21. As noted in the 2024-2026 CAP Strategy, UNEP prioritizes CAP assistance for low volume consuming countries (LVCs), which have specific needs and conditions, and which require tailored and continuing support. Through Decision 93/95 (d)(ii), the Executive Committee approved an increase in the CAP budget for the years 2024, 2025 and 2026 for providing technical and policy assistance to LVC countries to support KIP implementation. This year will be the third and final installment of that funding provision, noting that each year's approval has a unique duration of 24 months.

22. In 2026, UNEP will use this special assistance to support LVCs that have approved KIPs that are in the implementation stage, as well as those that would be submitted to the Executive Committee for consideration at the 97th and 98th meetings (for 2025 activities, see Section II, *CAP Progress Report: Report on technical and policy support for LVC countries to support KIP implementation*). This will be done through existing activities funded under the first installment of this assistance (Strengthen Capacity of LVCs on Licensing and Quota System and Consumption Trends; and Strengthening the Local Installation and Assembly Sector in Commercial Refrigeration for LVC Countries), Training of CAP staff on energy efficiency and MEPs, a new activity (Safe Sustainable Cooling for Africa: Strengthening Occupational Safety in the RAC Sector) and by hiring consultants to supplement the CAP team's technical and policy support for LVC countries to support KIP implementation. As part of 2027 CAP progress report, UNEP will provide a preliminary summary of the achievements of the first two years of this special assistance.

PART II: HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 CAP PROGRESS REPORT

Introduction

23. This report provides highlights of the progress made by UNEP in the implementation of the Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP) and results achieved for the period September 2024 - August 2025, i.e., since the submission of the previous CAP Progress Report. Progress is presented according to

the eight outcomes and 85 activities and indicators listed in the Logical Framework Analysis of the 2025 CAP Strategy⁴.

24. Highlights of UNEP's achievements are provided in the summary below. More details can be found in the section that follows, as well as in Annex 5 – *Details of 2025 CAP Progress Report*, Annex 7 – *Progress report on global CAP activities*; Annex 8 – *Report on the use of CAP staff time*; and Annex 9 – *Meetings and workshops organized by CAP*.

Highlights

25. During the period September 2024 - August 2025, UNEP made significant progress in assisting Article 5 countries in meeting and sustaining compliance with their Montreal Protocol obligations through the delivery of the planned CAP activities and services. Overall achievements include the following:

- The 2025 CAP Progress Report demonstrates UNEP OzonAction significant contribution to support Article 5 countries in sustaining their commitments through a combination of targeted national support, regional cooperation, training, and policy guidance. CAP sought to continue to be responsive to emerging challenges, including institutional changes, compliance challenges, and obligations under the Kigali Amendment.
- Across all regions, UNEP OzonAction provided assistance for over 100 country-specific technical assistance activities, convened 24 regional and thematic network meetings, and supported 147 cases of data collection and reporting to prevent non-compliance. Special emphasis was placed on establishing and enforcing HFC licensing and quota systems, enhancing customs enforcement capacity, and building synergies between ozone protection, energy efficiency, and climate policy. Gender integration was also considered across activities, with new opportunities created for women's engagement in the Refrigeration and Air-Conditioning (RAC) sector.
- A central achievement in 2025 was the integration of energy efficiency into Montreal Protocol activities. Through the completion of Phase I of the Ozone Officers–Energy Efficiency Policymakers Twinning Project, UNEP built bridges between National Ozone Units (NOUs), energy policymakers, and financial focal points across all regions. This initiative not only strengthened technical knowledge and policy coordination but also produced regional and global reports with actionable recommendations on maintaining or enhancing energy efficiency during the HFC phase-down. Article 5 countries were supported with technician training, legislative options, and pilot projects, ensuring that efficiency gains are sustained in both new and existing RAC systems.
- Another area of focus was support to low-volume consuming (LVC) countries, which face unique compliance challenges due to their small size and limited resources. UNEP OzonAction provided LVC-targeted technical and policy assistance for the design and implementation of Kigali Implementation Plans (KIPs) and HPMP activities. Tailored missions, country-specific training, and contractual arrangements ensured that LVC countries could strengthen their NOUs, improve data reporting, and introduce low- Global Warming Potential (GWP) technologies while maintaining energy efficiency. These efforts helped safeguard the compliance of some of the most

vulnerable Parties to the Protocol, while also ensuring that they benefit from w funding opportunities under the Multilateral Fund.

- Overall, during the reporting period, Article 5 countries have continued to strengthen their institutional and technical capacities, enabling them to sustain compliance while working to meet obligations under the Kigali Amendment and related energy efficiency objectives.

26. Highlights of the achievements based on the outcomes include:

Outcome 1: National Ozone Units effectively manage their national programmes

- Provided support to NOUs to ensure they function effectively, and Institutional Strengthening (IS) projects are implemented. Technical assistance was provided to NOUs through 101 IS projects, including their preparation, implementation, and monitoring. *As a result, most NOUs were able to deliver their IS activities, strengthen institutional structures, focused on compliance with the Montreal Protocol reporting obligations and phaseout targets, and national stakeholders and public are supportive of Montreal protocol objectives.*
- 107 region- and country-specific services were delivered to address technical, policy, and operational challenges. These included support for HFC licensing systems, compliance missions, and project troubleshooting. For example, missions were conducted to Federated States of Micronesia, Republic of the Marshall Islands, Tonga, Kiribati, Nauru, Vanuatu, Fiji, Solomon Islands, Tuvalu, Papua New Guinea to review the status of Multilateral Fund project implementation, identify country-specific implementation challenge and provide country-specific support and advice to the NOO and stakeholders during the mission. *As a result, countries received targeted solutions to prevent delays and potential non-compliance.*
- Provided a platform for exchanges among NOUs and key partners to cultivate experience and best practices sharing through 24 regional and thematic network meetings, reaching all ten CAP regions. Examples include the joint South Asia–West Asia meeting in India, thematic workshops on KIP design in Mombasa, and a youth-focused workshop in Belize. These meetings discussed such issues as suitable long term alternative technologies for the air conditioning sector, national inventory of ODS/HFC banks, strategies for management of unwanted controlled substances, and sustainable cooling. *As a result, countries received support to deal with emerging issues, information and good examples were shared, and networking was enhanced.*
- 84 new Ozone Officers and assistants across Eastern Europe and Central Asia, Africa, South-East Asia, Pacific Islands countries, West Asia and Caribbean regions were trained, ensuring they gained the fundamental skills to manage national compliance programmes. While advanced training and negotiation skills workshops were postponed, preparations are underway to launch them in the next cycle. Two regions benefited from training environmental inspectors for the first time. *As a result, new NOUs acquired the core skills needed to implement Montreal Protocol activities at the national level through enhanced knowledge and resources/*
- 34 activities were delivered in the context of South-South and North-South cooperation. Examples include study visits to Singapore and the Philippines on energy efficiency and electronic licensing systems, a technology roundtable in Serbia, and bilateral collaboration between West Asian countries on certification schemes. *As a result, countries shared practical*

experiences on technology, policy, and enforcement. These exchanges deepened regional cooperation and transferred practical solutions to existing challenges.

- In exploring synergies related to Kigali Amendment objectives with national energy efficiency policymakers the first phase of the Twinning Project was completed with 422 participants brought together from nine networks. NOUs collaborated with national energy efficiency and finance focal points, strengthening technical and policy linkages under the Kigali Amendment. A proposal for Phase II of the Twinning Project was formulated reflecting the evolving needs of countries under the Kigali Amendment and placing greater emphasis on strengthening national policy frameworks, deepening technical capacity, and enhancing inter-agency coordination. *As a result, NOUs deepened collaboration with energy efficiency policymakers and laid the groundwork for Phase II of the Twinning Project.*
- In support of the ODS/HFC Banks & Lifecycle Management UNEP OzonAction supported 50 projects and sessions across all regions on inventories of unwanted substances. Countries piloted strategies conducted site visits to destruction facilities, and shared methodologies for data collection and analysis. *As a result, countries have advanced plans for managing used or unwanted controlled substances.*

Outcome 2: Article 5 countries report accurate and timely data

- Monitored Article 7 and Country Programme data reporting for 147 countries, providing reminders, technical guidance, and tailored support. For example, a session on the new online Country Programme data reporting system was organized during the Network Meeting for South Asia National Ozone Officers held in Bangkok, a follow-up support was provided to Chile, El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras on online Country Programme data reporting in cooperation with the Multilateral Fund Secretariat and to Grenada, Saint Kitts and Nevis and Suriname on the submission of 2023 A7 data to avoid potential non-compliance. *As a result, countries avoided late submissions and strengthened compliance.*
- 59 countries received direct support for data collection and accuracy checks. For example, Georgia and the Republic of Moldova were assisted in preparing their KIP baselines, assistance was provided to Pacific Island Countries (PICs) with reconciling import/export data, and targeted assistance was delivered to Grenada, Suriname, and Saint Kitts and Nevis to prevent potential non-compliance. *As a result, inconsistencies were reduced and reporting improved.*
- In collaboration with the Multilateral Fund Secretariat, UNEP OzonAction organized orientation sessions to ensure NOUs have a good understanding of the revised formats and could use the platforms effectively. Timely reminders and one-on-one assistance were provided to countries experiencing technical difficulties.
- Over 50 training sessions, reminders, and technical sessions were delivered to enhance NOUs understanding of the new online system guidelines for data reporting and accessing A7 data reporting system and the new online Country Programme reporting system. *As a result, awareness of NOUs on the use of online reporting platform was raised.*
- Methodologies and best practices were shared with 147 NOUs, encouraging cross-checking, reconciliation, use of multiple data sources, and analysis of discrepancies with trading partners. *As a result, national data quality was strengthened.*
- HFC Quota Tracking and Monitoring Tool were pilot tested in two countries aiming to help countries calculate allocations in CO₂-equivalent terms and compare them against quotas.

- NOUs from Group 2 countries were provided with information to establish their HFC baselines and the starting point for sustained aggregate reductions in HFC consumption. NOUs received support in identifying and resolving discrepancies between national and partner country trade data, including use of Informal Prior Informed Consent (iPIC). Through network meetings, country missions, and consultations with National Ozone Officers (NOOs), countries were assisted with HFC data collection, considering new usage sectors and baseline calculations. *As a result, countries improved accuracy and transparency.*

Outcome 3: Effective legal, regulatory, and policy frameworks

- A number of sessions on monitoring, reporting, verification and enforcement (MRVE) systems were organized in different regions. Countries in Latin America for example were informed about the best practices and preventative approaches to enhance their national MRVE systems, some regions identified the need of the network to further strengthen collaboration with the customs authorities on MRVE systems through the existing mechanisms.
- Article 5 countries received assistance in establishing and enforcing HCFC/HFC licensing and quota systems, including electronic systems. Special attention was given to countries in Group 1 that had not yet operationalized HFC licensing. Electronic licensing systems were introduced to Kenya, Namibia, Rwanda, and Zimbabwe, while also countries like Bhutan received support to set up quota management tools. Best practices on establishing electronic systems to improve monitoring and control were promoted.
- NOUs from Parties which have not yet ratified the Kigali Amendment received support for their national ratification processes, including targeted assistance in Africa, South Asia, and West Asia. For example, missions and consultations were carried out in the Central African Republic, Iran, Nepal, and Pakistan, aiming these countries to overcome institutional and political barriers to ratification.
- Support was provided in drafting or amending national regulations as part of countries' national legal frameworks, with UNEP technical/legal advisory input. Examples include strengthening enforcement provisions, integrating energy efficiency into refrigerant regulations, and designing Monitoring, Reporting, Verification, and Enforcement systems. Engagement model is being developed to secure cooperation with UNEP's Montevideo Environmental Law Programme.
- Countries were encouraged to join and effectively use the iPIC mechanism to enhance compliance and trade controls.

Outcome 4: Imports and exports controlled; illegal trade reduced

- NOUs received support in updating and implementing regulations to monitor trade in controlled substances and prevent and combat illegal trade. Collaborated with WCO on a number of activities, including information notes, training materials, information about enforcement operations. Encouraged NOUs to set up electronic licensing and tracking systems to improve transparency.
- Supported national and regional workshops and sessions with customs and/or on customs matters. Regional network meetings facilitated discussions on enforcement matters such as electronic tracking and establishing national and regional HS codes for HFCs.
- Strengthened engagement with international enforcement partners such as Interpol, Europol, and United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), linking refrigerant smuggling with broader crime prevention strategies. Encouraged all NOUs in the regions to participate in the

online briefing sessions on the World Customs Organization (WCO) enforcement Operation Demeter and Police enforcement operation Custos Viridis led by Europol and encourage them to promote their countries' participation in the enforcement operations. This approach recognized that combating illegal trade requires multi-agency cooperation at national, regional, and global levels.

- Supported NOU-Customs Border Dialogues to strengthen collaboration at national borders and promote the Green Customs Initiative.

Outcome 5: Stakeholder and public support

- Produced OzoNews (bi-weekly), factsheets, leaflets, and other supporting materials, maintained the OzonAction website and Meeting Portal, and updated Knowledge Maps to provide accessible data.
- Promoted tools and materials produced by the OzonAction through national, regional, and global activities, e.g. WhatGas application and Refrigerant Identifier Video, iPIC online platform, to new a few.
- Public awareness was raised through support for international days of action: World Ozone Day (September 16), World Refrigeration Day (June 26), and World Customs Day (January 26). These events helped highlight national achievements and mobilize public and political support for Montreal Protocol objectives.
- Engaged with global and regional fora to link Montreal Protocol objectives with climate and sustainable development agendas, ensuring ozone issues remained visible in wider policy dialogues.
- Key materials were translated into UN languages based on regional demand.

Outcome 6: Adoption of low-GWP technology and workforce skills

- Continued to equip NOUs with information and curricula to guide refrigerant management and safe adoption of alternatives. Updated training materials for technicians were disseminated, with emphasis on leak reduction, energy efficiency, and safe handling of flammable refrigerants.
- Certification schemes advanced, with UNEP promoting the Refrigerant Driving License (RDL) concept and supporting countries to build or strengthen national systems. Cooperation with Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) institutions and universities was encouraged, with initiatives to integrate refrigerant management into engineering education.
- Special focus was placed on the cold chain and mobile air conditioning sectors, both of which are critical for compliance and food security. South-South cooperation, including site visits to destruction facilities and manufacturers, helped NOUs and technicians learn best practices.

Outcome 7: Energy efficiency in the RAC sector

- Energy efficiency gained new prominence in 2025 as countries linked Kigali obligations with sustainable cooling goals. UNEP concluded Phase I of the Twinning Project, holding eight regional workshops with 422 participants. These workshops brought NOUs together with energy efficiency policymakers and financial focal points, fostering a culture of collaboration across traditionally separate sectors.
- The workshops produced region-specific reports and a consolidated global report highlighting lessons learned and actionable recommendations. Common themes included the need for

integrated regulatory frameworks, financing models such as “cooling as a service,” and stronger inter-agency coordination.

- Provided guidance on integrating energy efficiency into RAC legislation and building codes. Countries were assisted in reviewing registration/approval procedures and developing procurement policies for efficient RAC appliances.

Outcome 8: Gender integration

- Strengthened gender related efforts by ensuring all Multilateral Fund projects included gender considerations in line with Multilateral Fund Gender Policy. Tools and methodologies for gender assessments were provided to NOUs, and discussions on gender were integrated into regional network meetings.
- Promoted women’s participation in the RAC sector through mentorship opportunities with the International Network of Women in Cooling (INWIC). UNEP also encouraged NOUs to actively include women in customs and enforcement training, expanding their representation in traditionally male-dominated fields.
- Supported awareness-raising, training, and information-sharing to increase women’s participation in RAC and customs.

OVERARCHING: Article 5 countries meet their commitments through effective and timely implementation of Multilateral Fund projects

- Assisted Article 5 countries with the preparation and submission of 154 projects approved at the 95th and 96th Executive Committee meetings – including 34 HPMP tranches and new stages, 40 HPMP verification projects, 28 KIP preparation and submission projects, 50 KIP implementation projects, 20 energy efficiency components under decision 89/6, 1 pilot project under decision 91/65, and 35 ODS banks and disposal projects under decision 91/66. As a result, most countries submitted project proposals on time and in line with UNEP’s Business Plan, though some regions faced delays for which UNEP is providing priority support.
- Supported the implementation of HPMPs in 102 countries (75 as Lead Agency and 27 as Cooperating Agency) and KIPs in 50 countries (32 as Lead Agency and 18 as Cooperating Agency), alongside the implementation of 39 energy efficiency projects. As a result, Article 5 countries remained on track with their Montreal Protocol obligations, HCFC phase-out was sustained, and KIP implementation was effectively initiated.

2025 INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

In commemoration of 2025 International Women's Day, the significant progress and the ongoing challenges in achieving gender equality within the Refrigeration and Air Conditioning (RAC) sector, known globally as HVACR (Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning and Refrigeration) was highlighted. Initiatives from around the world, including countries such as Grenada, North Macedonia, Sierra Leone, Armenia and Peru, are paving the way for a more inclusive and equitable industry.

For International Women's Day 2025, OzonAction produced a video showcasing good practices of national gender mainstreaming activities, initiatives, and campaigns that were part of the implementation of Montreal Protocol projects and activities.



ASSESSING RAC PLANT SUSTAINABILITY TOOL BY ASHRAE WITH SUPPORT FROM UNEP



To achieve energy-efficient, safe, and environmentally sustainable performance, RAC plants must meet key parameters in eight dimensions of practice plus the use of appropriate tools and servicing techniques.

To enable plant managers and service technicians to assess their progress, ASHRAE and UNEP OzonAction have developed Best Practices Checklists describing the mindset needed for each dimension of practice, objective, required actions, measures of success, and additional resources.

The checklists are supported by guidance sheets providing instructions on the steps to be taken.

There is no cost to access the checklists, but registration is required. Registration enables UNEP and ASHRAE to send free updates and solicit feedback.

- Periodic Leak Checking and Proper Documentation
- Preventive Maintenance of Equipment

GLOBAL CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT OPERATION DEMETER X

The tenth iteration of WCO Operation DEMETER, which targets illicit wastes, ozone depleting substances (ODS) and potent greenhouse gases, took place over eight weeks in the second semester of 2024. It saw the participation of a record 110 Customs administrations and led to 450 seizures. UNEP OzonAction has been a committed partner in DEMETER operations since 2019 when the Montreal Protocol was added to the scope of the operation, providing technical expertise, capacity-building support and networking opportunities among national Customs and ozone officers, particularly to developing countries under the Montreal Protocol.

Outcomes of the operation DEMETER X:

- **450 seizures** were reported by **42.7% of participating administrations**—a **28.2% increase** from 2023.
- **99 seizures** involved **ODS, HFCs, or equipment** containing controlled substances, reported by **17 Members**—a **70% rise** in reporting administrations and a **115% surge** in seizures compared to DEMETER IX.
- **344,625.9 kg** of ODS & HFCs were intercepted, alongside **24,198.9 kg** and **11,620 pieces** of non-compliant equipment.

HFCs were the most-seized illicit commodity in the 2024 operation, reflecting disparities in phase-down schedules between developed and developing countries. High demand, coupled with attempts to bypass licensing systems, has created a lucrative black market. Smugglers exploit countries with remaining production quotas, shipping banned substances to regions where quotas are dwindling.

Additionally, Customs officials noted a rise in seizures of older equipment containing phased-out ODS/HFCs, as well as newer non-compliant devices. Equipment with obsolete refrigerants may fall under both the Basel Convention (as e-waste) and the Montreal Protocol, requiring close collaboration between Customs and environmental authorities to classify and act. During DEMETER X, eight administrations reported 27 seizures of illegal equipment, weighing over 24 metric tons, plus an additional 11,620 individual units.



PART III: 2026 CAP BUDGET

Overview of proposed 2026 budget

Summary

1. While developing this budget proposal, UNEP considered feedback received from Article 5 countries about their needs related to early preparation for the total phase out target for HCFCs in 2030, maintaining the HFC freeze and preparing for the upcoming reduction targets (Group 1 countries), preparing for the upcoming HFC freeze (Group 2 countries), new Kigali Amendment responsibilities, and recent developments under the Montreal Protocol. The proposal also reflects UNEP's internal analysis of the CAP structure, staff roles and responsibilities, and the distribution of resources within CAP. It also considers the funds returned to the previous Executive Committee as an indication of actual expenditure. UNEP continues to exercise due diligence and optimise activities and costs to ensure the most efficient use of funds.
2. UNEP undertook an in-depth review of the actual annual expenditures for the CAP for the period 2024-2025 and this was compared with the partial expenditures for the current year up to 25 August 2025 to make projections for 2026. In accordance with Decision 95/83(c)(iv), Table 1 presents a proposed budget for 2026 and a report on the costs incurred in the prior years.
3. To deliver the planned comprehensive compliance assistance services to Article 5 countries during 2026, UNEP requests Executive Committee approval of US\$ 12,179,124, which consists of a project cost of US\$ 11,276,967 and programme support costs (PSC) of US\$ 902,157 (8%). For personnel lines, this request reflects a 3% increase on staff lines to cover inflationary costs for encumbered positions and year 2025 UN standard costs for vacant positions. For activity lines, this request is based on a zero-growth scenario. This increase includes the US\$ 150,000 allocated to UNEP for technical and policy support for low-volume consuming (LVC) countries to support KIP implementation as per Decision 93/95 (d)(ii).
4. In total, this request represents an increase of 0.77% compared to the 2025 budget. The proposed budget is within the 3% threshold that is allowed under Executive Committee Decision 47/24 (a)(iii), which limits the increase in the CAP budget to that amount unless the Executive Committee is given evidence that inflationary pressures justify otherwise.
5. Based on the projected requirements, UNEP proposes a 2026 budget level that is realistic and sufficient to cover CAP operations, noting that UNEP continues to return all unspent balances from CAP to the Executive Committee in a timely manner in accordance with Decision 35/36(d).

Personnel component

6. UNEP has based the 2026 staff costs for encumbered positions on the projected actual costs for those positions, which reflect real costs that are being incurred during the current year (i.e., 2025), plus a

3% increase to account for inflation. It is important to note that staff entitlements and benefits change from year to year and from duty station to duty station, in accordance with the UN staff regulations and rules, and final costs incurred can vary depending on the number of dependents, education grant entitlement, home leave, etc. applicable in a particular year. For vacant positions, UNEP has used the official UN 2025 standard costs since the actual costs for those positions will only be known after they are encumbered. These two factors have resulted in slight adjustments to the costs of all staffing lines.

Changes to existing staff lines

7. UNEP is not proposing any changes to the staff lines for 2026.

8. In line with the Executive Director's guidance about prudent budget management and organizational resilience, starting from 21 February 2025 all UNEP job openings for positions of one year or longer are advertised as Fixed-Term Appointment (FTA)-limited and all appointments are renewed for a maximum of one year. All OzonAction positions are now subject to this approach.

Structure

9. UNEP's continued high level of performance as an Implementing Agency of the Multilateral Fund, thanks to the expertise, dedication, and hard work of the Regional and Global CAP teams in five duty stations. Over the years, these Montreal Protocol professionals have evolved both individually and collectively to meet the ever-changing needs of Article 5 countries and to adjust to the evolution of the Montreal Protocol, including the new Kigali Amendment developments. This flexibility and ability to adapt quickly to respond to country needs is one of the hallmarks of CAP. An organigram describing the structure of CAP for 2026 follows.

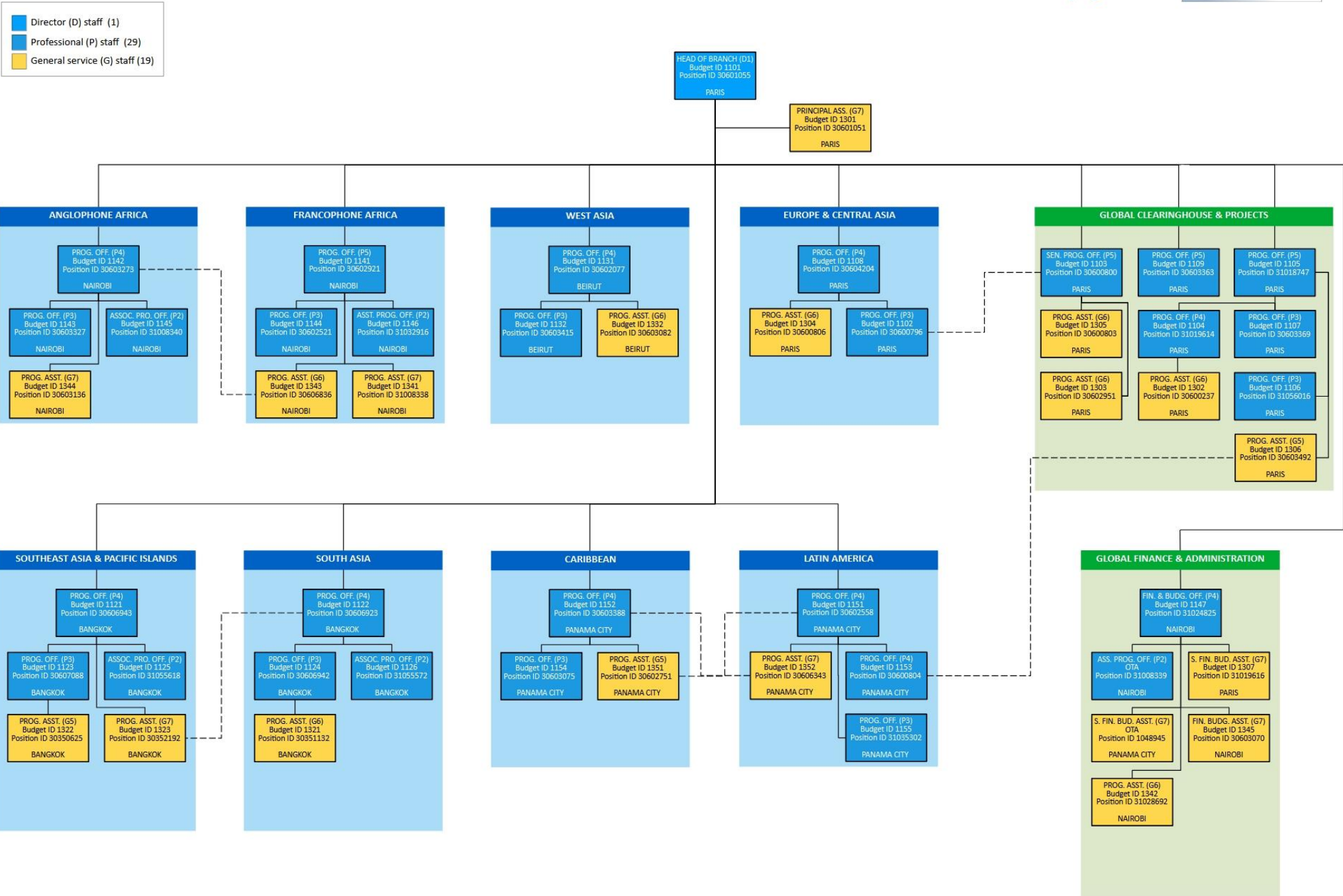

- Delay or incomplete progress reporting by some countries due to the long process of data verification at national level (particularly in countries with political instability)
- Unstable currency markets fluctuating during project implementation
- Unreliability of information technology in some developing countries; access to email and prompt communication very limited in some countries
- Increased trend of introducing high-GWP alternatives due to lower prices and commercial availability compared to low/lower GWP options particularly for RAC
- Technology and economic related concerns for high-ambient operating conditions
- Difficulties related to harmonizing standards and codes at the regional level
- Weak infrastructure of the RAC servicing sector in most developing countries
- RAC servicing sector and Customs not considered attractive professions for young people particularly young women

In 2026, UNEP anticipates providing services in this category to the following Article 5 (and CEIT) countries, noting that these emerging needs will be determined in the coming months upon a case-by-case request by countries and upon assessing the needs of the countries:

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Annex 4 – OzonAction partnerships for 2026

1. Since becoming an Implementing Agency of the Multilateral Fund in 1991, UNEP OzonAction has established and maintained long-standing partnerships with key international, regional, and national industry associations, professional societies, international organizations, government agencies, industry groups, and non-governmental organizations to further the objectives of the Montreal Protocol and more recently, the Kigali Amendment. These world-recognized partners bring their institutional reputation, expertise, and knowledge products to bear on issues related to implementation or enforcement of this multilateral environmental agreement in Article 5 countries. OzonAction's partnership activities produce and deliver the necessary support, tools and services that Article 5 countries efficiently implement their commitments under the Montreal Protocol and the Kigali Amendment and respond to emerging concerns and issues. These partnerships cover most of the important focus areas for Article 5 Parties including:

- Engagement of the refrigeration and air conditioning (RAC) sector in supporting Montreal Protocol and Kigali Amendment objectives.
- Strengthening refrigeration servicing technicians through training, certification, awareness-raising, information exchange, and workforce development.
- Promotion and facilitation of the adoption of suitable lower-global warming potential (GWP) alternatives and technology.
- Promotion and facilitation of the adoption of technologies and practices that maintain or enhance the energy efficiency (EE) in existing and new RAC equipment.
- Assessing and analyzing the trends in consuming controlled substances in different sectors.
- Development and update of codes and standards.
- Engagement of the customs and enforcement communities in supporting Montreal Protocol and Kigali Amendment objectives.
- Strengthening customs and enforcement officers to better monitor trade in controlled substances and combat their illegal trade through training, awareness-raising, and information exchange.
- Support for the development and enforcement of national customs policies, regulations and HS codes related to the Montreal Protocol.

2. Table 1 provides an overview of all OzonAction partnerships. More detailed information about the partners with whom OzonAction intends to cooperate in 2026 on different initiatives, products, and activities is presented in table 2 on the List of OzonAction partnership in 2026. OzonAction may engage with new partners during the course of the year depending on the needs of Article 5 countries and other emerging issues in relation to the implementation of the Montreal Protocol.

3. In addition to partnerships mentioned above, OzonAction actively cooperates with the Ozone Secretariat and the Multilateral Fund Secretariat, as well as with our sister Implementing Agencies United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), and the World Bank, and bilateral agencies. OzonAction also cooperates with UNEP-led initiatives such as the Cool Coalition, the Climate and Clean Air Coalition (CCAC) and United for Efficiency (U4E) on the implementation of compliance assistance programme activities and Multilateral Fund funded projects.

The briefs are being prepared in English, French and Spanish. - During the reporting period, the ASHRAE–UNEP OzonAction partnership continued to advance its joint efforts to promote climate-friendly innovation and enhance technical knowledge dissemination in the refrigeration and air-conditioning (RAC) sector. 2025 ASHRAE–UNEP OzonAction Lower-GWP Innovation Awards (One Award concluded): The 2025 cycle of the ASHRAE–UNEP OzonAction Lower-GWP Refrigeration and Air-Conditioning Innovation Awards has been successfully concluded and promoted globally. This initiative aims to recognize and encourage the development and implementation of innovative, climate-conscious technologies in developing countries. The awards specifically highlight projects that demonstrate the use of low-global warming potential (GWP) refrigerants in RAC applications. This year, nine submissions were evaluated by an international panel of judges, resulting in the selection of two winning projects in the residential applications category: one focused on R487A use in single-cooling air conditioners, and the other on a hybrid R290-PVTS-heat pump system. The judging process included both independent reviews and virtual deliberations, with unanimous agreement on the selected projects. A promotion and recognition plan has been
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			developed to maximize the visibility of the award and stimulate future participation. Discussions are also underway to refine the award's structure and criteria for future cycles, with a focus on increasing impact and alignment with Kigali Amendment objectives. Winning entries were showcased through UNEP and ASHRAE communication channels. Updated Refrigerant Designations and Safety Classifications Factsheet (This informative factsheet undergoes biannual updates with Multilingual availability): UNEP and ASHRAE collaborated to update and disseminate the latest edition of the New Refrigerants Designations and Safety Classifications factsheet. This technical resource provides an overview of refrigerants that have been assigned an "R" number under ASHRAE Standard 34 and introduced into the international market in recent years. Key features of the update include: The inclusion of newly approved refrigerants and their corresponding safety classifications based on toxicity and flammability. Clarification of the evolving classification system, including the standalone flammability subclass 2L. Multilingual availability to support global accessibility and outreach to National Ozone Units (NOUs), industry stakeholders, and training institutions. The factsheet was widely disseminated through the OzonAction website, regional networks, and technical events, reinforcing its role as a trusted reference for safe refrigerant selection and use.

Annex 6 – Report on technical and policy support for LVC countries

Pursuant to Decision 93/95(d)(ii), the Executive Committee approved an increase in the CAP budget for the years 2024, 2025, and 2026 to enhance the provision of technical and policy assistance to LVC countries in support of KIP implementation. In response to this decision, UNEP conducted internal brainstorming sessions involving both its global and regional CAP teams to strategically identify priority areas for targeted support to LVC countries under the Kigali Implementation Plans (KIPs). Through this consultative process, four thematic areas were selected based on their relevance, potential impact, and replicability across LVC contexts. These themes are: (1) Strengthen Capacity of LVCs on Licensing and Quota System and Consumption Trends; (2) Early action to support LVCs in the mobile air conditioning (MAC) sector; (3) Strengthening the Local Installation and Assembly Sector in Commercial Refrigeration for LVC Countries; and (4) Training of CAP staff on energy efficiency and MEPs. This approval was granted with the understanding that UNEP would, inter alia, report on the technical and policy assistance activities delivered to LVC countries and their resulting impact, as part of the narrative in its CAP annual progress reports. The present report is submitted in response to that decision. Noting that the activities are still in the implementation phase at the time of submission of this document, the prioritized areas for this special assistance to LVC countries are outlined below.

1. Strengthen Capacity of LVCs on Licensing and Quota System and Consumption Trends

This activity is designed to support LVCs whose Kigali HFC Implementation Plans (KIPs) have been approved by the Executive Committee. The objective is to enhance:

- a) **Implementation and enforcement capacity** through the establishment of a robust and enforceable HFC licensing and quota system. This system is inherently more complex than the mechanisms required for HCFC control, as it involves the regulation of a broader range of substances and necessitates control based on carbon dioxide equivalent (CO₂e) tonnes.
- b) **Institutional capacity of the National Ozone Units (NOUs)** to monitor consumption trends and conduct more comprehensive and in-depth analyses. This will enable the generation of reliable and detailed data, which is essential for understanding prevailing consumption patterns and forecasting future demand. Such insights are critical for the effective implementation of HFC phase-down strategy.

UNEP OzonAction has engaged an international consultant to undertake two distinct assignments: (i) a comprehensive evaluation of the procedures governing various types of HFC licensing and quota systems, including data monitoring and reporting mechanisms, with the objective of identifying systemic gaps and recommending enhancements in two selected LVCs under UNEP's leadership; and (ii) a detailed analysis of HFC consumption trends relative to baseline levels in two selected LVCs, focusing on the underlying drivers of fluctuations in consumption patterns, the specific requirements of domestic markets, and projections of future demand. The findings from both assessments will inform the development of targeted recommendations to strengthen national capacities and support the implementation of HFC phase-down strategies. Based on the findings of these assessments, the international consultant will deliver the following specific outputs:

- Prepare a comprehensive report detailing the procedures of various HFC trade control licensing systems in two selected Low-Volume Consuming Countries (LVCs), along with two supporting factsheets/information materials: one focused on the HFC licensing and quota system, and the other on data monitoring and reporting mechanisms.
- Develop a detailed analytical report on the assessment of HFC consumption trends in comparison with baseline data in two LVCs, accompanied by one factsheet/information material outlining the methodology used for consumption trend analysis.
- Disseminate the findings and outcomes of the assessments and reports through Montreal Protocol-related meetings.

2. Early action to support LVCs in the mobile air conditioning (MAC) sector

The intervention aims to enhance the capacity of National Ozone Units (NOUs) to conduct comprehensive assessments of consumption within the Mobile Air Conditioning (MAC) sector.

- **Strengthen the capacity of NOUs** to comprehensively assess consumption in their MAC sectors, including but not limited to data on the size of vehicle fleets (new and used), types of refrigerants used, leakage rates, the number and scale of MAC servicing companies, the number of technicians working in the MAC sector (both formal and informal), the skill levels of MAC technicians, current servicing practices and equipment capabilities, the number of MAC training centers and the content of their training curricula, and end-of-life management practices for vehicles and MAC systems.
- **Evaluate national capacities** to implement containment measures within the MAC servicing sector and assess readiness to adopt potential alternative refrigerants and technologies.
- **Review existing policies, standards, and codes** governing refrigerants in the MAC servicing sector, and identify key institutional stakeholders involved in regulation and enforcement.
- **Establish a comprehensive database** that includes data on used vehicles and their contribution to refrigerant consumption within the MAC sector.

UNEP hired an international consultant to support all the above-mentioned activities. The main outputs are expected to be as follows:

- Develop a methodology for determining baseline data on HFC consumption in the MAC sector, expressed in both metric tons and CO₂-equivalent tons.
- Prepare a guide document for establishing a national inventory of MAC systems and MAC servicing workshops.
- Design a framework for a MAC Sector Response Plan, presented in a format that can be easily adapted and implemented by countries.
- Compile a comprehensive report on activities, including recommendations for integrating the Response Plan with the broader objectives and outcomes of the Kigali Implementation Plans (KIPs).

- Develop a resource package for dissemination to other LVC countries, to support replication and adaptation in similar projects.

This work is critical in enabling NOUs to make informed, data-driven decisions for effective policy development and implementation in the MAC sector. By building robust assessment capacities, countries can better monitor consumption patterns, identify opportunities for emission reductions, and ensure compliance with Kigali Amendment obligations. Moreover, the methodologies and tools developed through this initiative are highly replicable and adaptable, making them especially valuable for LVCs, which often face resource constraints but share similar sectoral challenges as non LVCs. Strengthening these foundational capabilities not only supports national environmental goals but also equips countries—particularly LVCs—with the necessary tools to effectively implement approved HFC phase-down strategies.

3. Strengthening the Local Installation and Assembly Sector in Commercial Refrigeration for LVC Countries

The commercial refrigeration sector in LVC countries plays a vital role in supporting public health services, food systems, and broader economic activities. Despite its importance in advancing the national transition away from high-GWP refrigerants, the local installation and assembly subsector remains inadequately supported by national policies and local programme frameworks. Technicians operating within the informal sector lack access to structured and accredited training programmes, regulatory oversight, and incentive mechanisms that would facilitate and encourage the adoption of environmentally sustainable practices in refrigeration servicing and installation. This activity seeks to address these gaps by establishing foundational standards for the installation and assembly of environmentally responsible commercial refrigeration systems. It comprises four interrelated components: sectoral assessment, technician registration and incentive schemes, development of technical toolkits, and targeted awareness-raising activities. Conceived as a UNEP initiative for LVCs, the project is intended to serve as a replicable model for other LVC countries facing similar challenges. As part of this initiative, UNEP has selected Africa as the initial focus region, with Zimbabwe serving as a key partner country under the pilot activity.

The expected outcomes of the activity are as follows:

- Deliver a comprehensive National Readiness Report identifying skill and equipment shortages, policy gaps, and institutional weaknesses.
- Design and pilot a National Technician Registry and incentive activities to enhance sector visibility and promote the adoption of low-GWP technologies.
- Provide a practical Commercial Refrigeration Toolkit comprising sizing software, technical checklists, and accompanying guidance materials.
- Foster sector engagement through targeted awareness materials and training resources, with content designed to be adaptable for replication in other LVC countries.

The activity was conceived from the outset with scalability as a core principle; each tool, report, and training resource being designed as a modular component, allowing for easy adaptation and replication by other LVC countries.

The activity commenced following the signing of the Small-Scale Funding Agreement (SSFA) between UNEP and the Ministry of Environment, Climate, Tourism, and Hospitality Industry. Prior to project initiation, the National Ozone Unit (NOU) convened an initial coordination meeting with the Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Association of Zimbabwe (HEVACRAZ). This meeting served to define the roles and responsibilities of key stakeholders, establishing timelines, and set standards for reporting and communication. It laid the groundwork for national partners to align expectations and facilitated deeper engagement at the field level.

A joint field mission was conducted alongside planning activities to inspect various installation and assembly enterprises across Zimbabwe. Representatives from both the NOU and HEVACRAZ participated in this mission. The site visits provided direct insights into technician practices and revealed significant challenges in accessing and handling low-GWP refrigerants, as well as the critical support required to improve operations. Technicians expressed a strong interest in formal recognition through a registry system, along with improved safety guidance for installations and better access to tools and spare parts. The findings underscored the need for data-driven evaluations and the development of specialized training programmes tailored to the sector's needs.

UNEP is implementing stakeholder's mapping and a readiness analysis. The following steps are scheduled for implementation during the third quarter of 2025:

- A stakeholder database is currently being planned and designed to identify key participants, their roles, and their potential influence on the subsector.
- A policy analysis is underway to examine existing standards, the regulatory framework, and institutional barriers within the commercial refrigeration sector.
- Preparations are ongoing for a national sector-wide survey, including the design of survey instruments. The survey will collect data on refrigerant usage, technician certification, and readiness to adopt low-GWP technologies.

These activities will support the development of a comprehensive Readiness Report, to be delivered by the end of 2025. The report will integrate a technical skills gap assessment as well as a mapping of tools and equipment.

The design of this activity incorporates built-in elements to facilitate future expansion. Key components—including the Readiness Report, the technician registry system, and the Commercial Refrigeration Toolkit—being structured to enable adaptation and deployment in other LVC countries. To support this objective, the following steps will be undertaken:

- Systematic documentation of lessons learned throughout the implementation process.
- Compilation of success stories and case studies to be shared with other regions.
- Collection of feedback from technicians, industry stakeholders, and regulatory bodies to improve the relevance, functionality, and usability of the system.

Ultimately, this activity serves as an adaptable model for assisting Article 5 countries in accelerating their transition to environmentally sustainable, low-GWP commercial refrigeration systems in assembly sector.

4. Training of CAP staff on energy efficiency and MEPs

Representatives from CAP Latin America region participated in the IEA Latin America Energy Efficiency Policy in Emerging Economies Training Week, held from 2 to 5 December 2024 in São Paulo, Brazil. Organized by the International Energy Agency (IEA), the event brought together regional stakeholders to explore the evolving landscape of energy efficiency policy across Latin America, with a particular emphasis on Brazil.

The training provided a valuable platform for participants to deepen their understanding of the opportunities, challenges, and solutions associated with energy efficiency in the region. Through a series of expert-led sessions and interactive discussions, attendees gained insights into how energy efficiency can deliver multiple benefits, including economic development, improved public health, and reduced greenhouse gas emissions.

A key focus of the training was on energy efficiency policy options, where participants examined a variety of instruments and approaches tailored to the Latin American context. These included regulatory frameworks, incentive mechanisms, and strategies for fostering public-private collaboration. The sessions emphasized the importance of designing policies that are both ambitious and adaptable to local realities. One of the thematic highlights was the exploration of energy efficiency in appliances and equipment. This segment addressed the potential for harmonized standards, labeling programs, and market transformation initiatives to drive improvements in energy performance. Participants discussed how regional cooperation could enhance the effectiveness of these measures and accelerate their implementation. Overall, the training week served as a strategic opportunity for CAP Latin America representatives to engage with peers, share experiences, and strengthen their capacity to support energy efficiency initiatives in their respective countries. The knowledge and perspectives gained during the event are expected to contribute meaningfully to ongoing efforts to advance sustainable energy policies throughout LVCs in the region.

5. Safe Sustainable Cooling for Africa: Strengthening Occupational Safety in the RAC Sector

In addition to the four initial thematic areas, UNEP identified a new area of work during the summer of 2025 to further support LVC countries: Safe and Sustainable Cooling for Africa: Strengthening Occupational Safety in the RAC Sector. Africa's refrigeration and air-conditioning (RAC) sector is at a pivotal moment. Driven by rapid urbanization, population growth, economic development, and the escalating impacts of climate change, the demand for cooling is rising sharply. Cooling is now essential for food preservation, vaccine storage, and maintaining safe living and working conditions. However, the sector remains largely informal characteristics that are emblematic of many LVCs, with limited regulation and inadequate safety oversight. Technicians still operate without proper training, protective equipment, or insurance, exposing them to serious risks such as burns, toxic exposure, electrocution, and falls. In this context, the transition to low-global warming potential (GWP) refrigerants under the Kigali Amendment presents both an environmental imperative and a safety challenge. Many of the

alternatives—such as hydrocarbons, ammonia, CO₂, and A2L refrigerants—are flammable, toxic, or high-pressure substances that require advanced safety protocols. These risks are particularly acute in LVC contexts, where technical capacity, regulatory enforcement, and access to safe technologies are often limited. Without adequate safeguards, their introduction could lead to increased accidents, resistance from technicians, and a loss of public and institutional confidence in alternatives. Recognizing this, UNEP is preparing *Safe and Sustainable Cooling for Africa: Strengthening Occupational Safety in the RAC Sector*, which places occupational safety and health (OSH) at the core of the refrigerant transition.

- Phase 1: Foundational OSH Risk Assessment will be conducted in one or two pilot countries to systematically document occupational hazards, accident patterns, and prevailing practices in the RAC sector. The assessment will benchmark existing national policies against international safety standards, providing a comparative lens to identify regulatory gaps. Extensive consultations will be held with NOUs, relevant ministries, vocational training institutes, and industry associations to ensure contextual accuracy and stakeholder alignment. The outcome will include country-specific diagnostic reports and a regional synthesis highlighting common risks, systemic weaknesses, and opportunities for targeted intervention.
- Phase 2: Communication and Behavior Change lays the groundwork for a transformative safety culture by equipping RAC technicians with knowledge and tools that are accessible, practical, and culturally resonant. This phase includes the development of pictorial warning labels and hazard indicators, ‘consequence posters’ that visually depict unsafe practices and their outcomes, and the dissemination of training content through WhatsApp videos and community radio programs. Technicians will also receive pocket-sized laminated job aids and illustrated brochures to reinforce safe practices in an engaging format. Together, these interventions foster a safety-first mindset, essential for scaling technical innovations and embedding behavioral change within institutions and communities—particularly in LVCs contexts where informal labor and limited access to formal training are prevalent.
- Phase 3: Innovation, Monitoring, and Scale-Up builds directly on the communication tools and behavioral shifts established in Phase 2 by providing technicians with the means to act safely and sustainably. Central to this phase is the development of a “Safety-Scan” mobile app that integrates Phase 2’s visual warnings and checklists, enabling technicians to assess risks in real time. To address affordability challenges common in LVCs, technician tool libraries will be established to provide access to essential hardware. Real-time dashboards will capture data on safe practices, enabling continuous monitoring and evidence-based decision-making. This phase transforms awareness into measurable action, institutionalizes safety innovations, and supports scalable solutions tailored to the realities of LVCs.
- Phase 4: Sustainability and Policy Integration ensures that the progress achieved in earlier phases is embedded within national systems and institutional frameworks, securing long-term impact. This includes the adoption of Kigali-aligned occupational safety and health (OSH) regulations and their integration into national KIPs (stage 2), reinforcing the refrigerant transition with robust safety standards. Communication tools, mobile apps, and tool libraries developed in previous phases will be institutionalized to support ongoing technician engagement and knowledge

retention. The phase also promotes the expansion of insurance schemes, certification programs, and social protection mechanisms for informal workers—key to elevating RAC sectors in LVCs where labor is often unregulated.

As a new initiative, Safe and Sustainable Cooling for Africa is still in its formative phase, and the full scope of activities and funding requirements is yet to be determined. UNEP will initiate activities and conduct a comprehensive assessment of the resources needed to implement the initiative effectively, ensuring that interventions are scalable and responsive to the needs of LVCs across Africa and other regions facing similar challenges. UNEP will provide an update on its progress and strategic direction in the next Compliance Assistance Programme (CAP) workplan and progress report.

Annex 7 – Progress report on global CAP activities

In accordance with the decision 95/82 of as set out in the report of the ninety-fifth meeting of the Executive Committee (UNEP/OzL.Pro/ExCom/95/94), this annex provides detailed information on the activities for which the global funds were used between September 2024 and August 2025. These are four multi-year activities, namely the global training for the refrigeration servicing sector, the National Ozone Officer (NOO) training programme, activities related to integrating differentiated needs and perspectives of women and men in the Montreal Protocol activities and global activities on enforcement and customs. This annex provides a brief update on the substantive progress and outcomes of those activities.

I. Global training programme for the Refrigeration Servicing Sector

The 2024-2026 CAP Strategy included several initiatives to address the specific training needs of the Refrigeration Servicing Sector (RSS), including the development of capacity building and outreach tools. The support to the RSS remains a priority of the CAP strategy, noting the importance of this sector in the hydrochlorofluorocarbon (HCFC) phase-out management plans (HPMPs) and upcoming Kigali Implementation Plans (KIPs).

An important aspect of CAP support to RSS is ensuring diversity of products and tools in a way that can meet diverse backgrounds of RSS clients as well as offering so through different platforms to facilitate access to knowledge and skills. In relation to RSS clients, CAP tools are designed to reach:

- (a) Field technicians or practitioners attending face-to-face training sessions
- (b) Field technicians or practitioners not able to attend face-to-face training sessions
- (c) Non-field personnel who need to be aware of refrigerant-related considerations
- (d) Training institutes/centres requiring flexible materials to tailor courses according to market
- (e) Informal technicians or those with limited literacy
- (f) Higher-level engineering students
- (g) Professional engineers and operators.

What is OzonAction?
OzonAction is part of the UN Environment Programme (UNEP) and supports governments and the cooling industry by promoting the safe transition to ozone and climate-friendly cooling technologies, to facilitate the implementation of the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer.

SUPPORT FOR RACHP TECHNICIANS

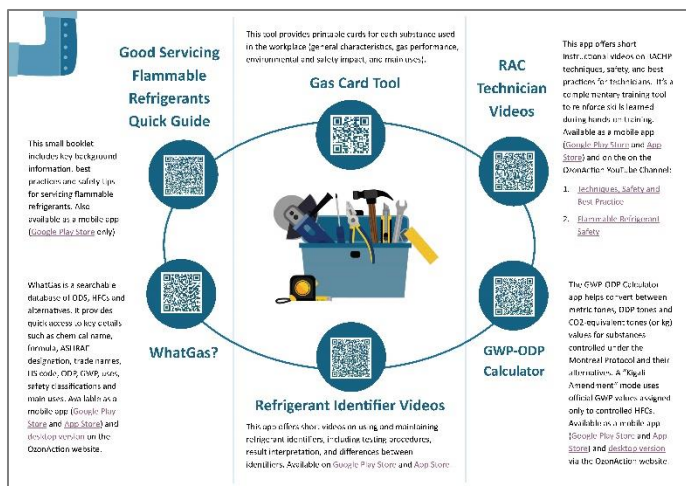

Therefore, CAP designed a range of services for RSS to be available in many formats and languages, as feasible, where it can reach all clients regardless of their background or limitations. In addition, CAP also ensured that materials can be easily and quickly updated, recognizing the fast-paced and dynamic nature of technological advancement. The type of tools offered by CAP for RSS clients includes factsheets/quick guides, training guides, educational tools, mobile applications, e-learning platform and short videos. Some highlights include:



Energy Efficiency Literacy for Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration Systems e-Learning

The course is designed to educate developing country policy makers, business leaders, and community stakeholders as well as National Ozone Units (NOUs) about the benefits of air conditioning and refrigeration, the scientific principles involved, and factors that contribute to maximum energy efficiency.

During this reporting period, the Energy Efficiency Literacy e-Learning Course was translated into French and Spanish to improve accessibility and meet growing interest from non-English-speaking countries. The course engaged 259 learners from 53 countries. The recent translation and renewed interest signal potential for a broader uptake in future implementation cycles and continued expansion of energy efficiency awareness worldwide.

Focal Point of Communication Pilot Programme

The “OzonAction & American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) Connect” pilot initiative was launched to establish structured focal points of communication between UNEP CAP regional networks and ASHRAE chapters that serve as local groups within the international ASHRAE organization for professionals. The pilot aims to leverage ASHRAE’s technical expertise to support NOUs in Article 5 countries through knowledge exchange, technical assistance, and co-developed tools.

The draft pilot plan has been developed and refined through multiple iterations, incorporating feedback from UNEP OzonAction and ASHRAE stakeholders. The plan outlines a phased approach, beginning with the identification of two regional networks and corresponding ASHRAE chapters. A request form and monitoring framework have been created to formalize engagement and track outcomes. Initial engagement with Grenada has been positive, with local stakeholders expressing interest in participating in the pilot.

During this reporting period, the Assessing the Refrigeration and Air Conditioning (RAC) Plant Sustainability Technical Guide, a comprehensive resource designed to support the sustainable operation and maintenance of RAC plants was finalized and launched in collaboration with ASHRAE. The guide covers eight key dimensions, including refrigerant handling, leak detection, energy efficiency, and technician competencies, and includes practical checklists and minimum tool requirements for field servicing. Initial dissemination has begun, with strong interest from stakeholders and over 70 early registrations. Next steps include broader outreach and possible integration of the guide into national training and policy frameworks.

University Course on Refrigerant Management

UNEP OzonAction teamed up with the American University in Beirut (AUB) to develop a special course for undergraduate engineering students. The course is the first of its type developed on the global level in accordance with academic requirements' targets engineering universities/colleges. It is a full semester elective course (16 weeks) designed with full supporting documentation. Through the cooperation with ASHRAE and its university networks comprising of over 450 engineering universities/colleges worldwide, the course is currently undergoing a comprehensive revision with the support by AUB in collaboration with ASHRAE. The revised course, now titled "Environmental Challenges and New Cooling Technology Solutions", aims to integrate updated scientific knowledge, enhanced pedagogical structure, and new modules on energy efficiency and alternative refrigerants. The revision is based on user feedback, survey analysis, and regional adaptation needs, including a Turkish version of the course. The updated syllabus has been submitted for review and is aligned with UNEP's broader educational goals under the Kigali Amendment.

The courses "Refrigerant Literacy" and "Energy Efficiency Literacy" have collectively attracted a total of 156 participants. And the "University Course on Refrigerant Management" has been requested by 24 educational institutions.

***UNEP-AREA Training Manual: Refrigerants Servicing and Best Practices*⁵**

Developed in cooperation with the Air Conditioning and Heat Pump Contractors (AREA), this modular manual supports training on refrigerant management and safety. It allows users, training institutes in Article 5 Parties, to customize courses via the [UNEP OzonAction Downloads Portal](#), which also tracks usage. The manual includes 10 modules covering refrigerant properties, environmental impact, and safe handling of HFCs, HFOs, and flammable refrigerants. Each module comes with lecture notes, PowerPoints, assessments, trainer and venue requirements, and a certificate template. Courses range from 5 to 56 hours and include both theoretical and practical content. Eight pre-assembled course options are also available. In 2025, UNEP OzonAction partnered with AREA to add a new Energy Efficiency module and Spanish translations on the existing modules.

Updated Refrigerant Designations and Safety Classifications: Good Servicing Flammable Refrigerants Quick Guide

A small booklet addressing key aspects related to background, best practices and safety when servicing with flammable refrigerants is available as a guide as well as a smartphone application.

Mobile applications for RAC technicians: New RAC Training Videos

A third series of instructional videos was developed in cooperation with Bundesfachschule Kälte-KlimaTechnik (BFS) to build the understanding and skill of technicians – both experienced and trainees – about basic refrigeration focusing on theory (refrigeration cycle, cold rooms, measurements, etc.) and best practices to encourage better performance and servicing.

During the reporting period, the ASHRAE–UNEP OzonAction partnership continued to advance its joint efforts to promote climate-friendly innovation and enhance technical knowledge dissemination in the RAC sector.

2025 ASHRAE–UNEP OzonAction Lower- GWP Innovation Awards

The 2025 cycle of the ASHRAE–UNEP OzonAction Lower- Global Warming Potential (GWP) Refrigeration and Air-Conditioning Innovation Awards has been successfully concluded and promoted at the global level. This initiative aims to recognize and encourage the development and implementation of innovative, climate-conscious technologies in developing countries. The awards specifically highlight

projects that demonstrate the use of low- GWP refrigerants in RAC applications. This year nine submissions were evaluated by an international panel of judges, resulting in the selection of two winning projects in the residential applications category: one focused on R487A use in single-cooling air conditioners, and another on a hybrid R290-PVTS-heat pump system. The judging process included both independent reviews and virtual deliberations with unanimous agreement on the selected projects. A promotion and recognition plan has been developed to maximize the visibility of the award and encourage future participation. Discussions are also underway to refine the award's structure and criteria for future cycles, with a focus on increasing impact and alignment with Kigali Amendment objectives. Winning entries were showcased through UNEP and ASHRAE communication channels.

WhatGas?

A searchable database with information on refrigerants and alternatives, which are also available on the UNEP OzonAction website. The tool was updated in 2023 to reflect the latest GWP values for some HFCs and HFC blends. The database is periodically updated to reflect the latest information on the substances.

Support for the MAC sector

UNEP OzonAction has developed the following two products in cooperation with Mobile Air Conditioning (MAC) Partners Europe aiming to assist Article 5 parties to better understand the technical and regulatory issues related to HFCs and alternatives used in the MAC sector and their national situation with regards to MAC servicing sector: MAC Information Kit, a series of factsheets to inform NOUs about the status of the MAC sector and help them better understand the MAC sector in relation to future HFC controls; and Data Collection Kit for MAC servicing sector.

Cold Chain Technology Briefs

In 2019, UNEP OzonAction in cooperation with the International Institute of Refrigeration (IIR) developed five Cold Chain Briefs covering the Cold Storage and Refrigerated Warehouse; Commercial, Professional and Domestic Refrigeration; Refrigeration in Food Production and Processing; Transport Refrigeration and Fishing Vessel Application. Additional Cold Chain Technology brief on Vaccines was developed in 2021. All briefs were prepared in three UN languages – English, French and Spanish. As part of 2024 CAP, UNEP OzonAction requested IIR to assess existing Cold Chain Technology Briefs in the light of the availability and the uptake of new technologies and new refrigerants in those refrigeration sub-sectors. The analysis showed that Cold Chain Technology Briefs on Refrigeration in food production and processing; Transport Refrigeration, and Vaccines are still relevant and up to date. The ones on Cold Storage and Refrigerated Warehouse, Commercial, Professional and Domestic Refrigeration and Fishing Vessel Applications need to be reissued to incorporate advancements in both refrigerant alternatives and technologies.

Additionally, UNEP OzonAction and IIR will develop an additional Cold Chain Technology Brief on Refrigerated Transport in Hot Climates. The new versions of four technology briefs will continue to support Article 5 parties and inform NOUs about the current situation and alternatives in the Cold Chain Sector. They will also facilitate the need to address the technical challenges related to equipment and existing and upcoming alternatives in the Cold Chain sub-sectors. These briefs will be prepared in English, French and Spanish languages. IIR and UNEP OzonAction will jointly organize the launch of the briefs at the MOP-37 in 2025 and three webinars to introduce technology briefs to the Ozone Officers and other stakeholders, and/or to update them on any new developments in the covered Cold Chain sub-sectors.

International Guide: Sustainable Operation and Management of RAC Installations

As part of ASHRAE-UNEP OzonAction cooperation and in line with their joint workplan, this product has been under development for the last couple of years aiming to design the first international guide for managing the operation of RAC installations with focus on management of refrigerant, servicing skills, proper and preventive maintenance as well as energy efficiency aspects. The draft guide was developed

and is currently being reviewed and evaluated by international experts.

II. National Ozone Officer Training Programme

A. Training for new National Ozone Officer (NOOs)

The Regional CAP team for the Europe and Central Asia (ECA) region, in collaboration with the global UNEP OzonAction team, successfully organized a three-day training workshop for newly appointed Montreal Protocol Unit (MPU) staff. The workshop was held from 15 to 17 October 2024 at the UNESCO premises in Paris. This initiative aimed to build the capacity of new MPU officers by equipping them with the foundational knowledge and practical skills necessary to effectively support their national governments in fulfilling obligations under the Montreal Protocol. The primary objective was to:

- Introduce new MPU staff to the Montreal Protocol, its structure, and its implementation mechanisms.
- Provide comprehensive insights into the roles and responsibilities of MPUs.
- Strengthen the participants' ability to contribute to their national compliance efforts.
- Share key resources and support channels available to MPU staff.

The following countries designated new MPU staff to participate in the training: Armenia, Georgia, Kyrgyzstan, Republic of Moldova, Serbia and Türkiye.

The workshop employed a dynamic and interactive training approach, combining:

- PowerPoint presentations and background documents
- Group discussions and case studies
- Online exercises and hands-on activities
- Interactive learning techniques to enhance engagement and retention

This training workshop was conducted with the simultaneous interpretation into Russian. This was the first time that such a NOU training was delivered with real-time interpretation using the Zoom platform, allowing broader and more inclusive participation from Russian-speaking MPU staff. By the end of the training, participants:

- Gained a solid understanding of the Montreal Protocol and its operational context
- Acquired practical skills applicable to their daily work in MPUs
- Became familiar with key sources of information and support networks
- Enhanced their ability to contribute to national compliance and reporting efforts.



In the long term, the training is expected to strengthen the overall effectiveness of MPU teams and support

national governments in meeting their commitments under the Montreal Protocol.

The training programme for newly appointed Ozone Officers and their assistants was structured in a harmonized and standardized manner across all regions, ensuring consistency in content delivery and alignment with the core responsibilities of NOUs. This approach was designed to empower participants with the knowledge, tools, and confidence needed to effectively carry out their duties in support of the Montreal Protocol. Recognizing the importance of a country-driven strategy, the programme emphasizes the need for each participating Party to have well-trained, motivated, and capable personnel who can manage and coordinate ozone-related activities at national, regional, and international levels.

B. Advanced (refresher) training for experienced NOOs

As part of the ongoing efforts to strengthen the capacity of NOUs in implementing the Montreal Protocol and its Kigali Amendment, the development of the Advanced National Ozone Officers Training Programme has reached a critical mid-point. The programme is designed to provide NOUs and associated personnel with the latest technical, policy, and procedural knowledge necessary to support their governments in fulfilling their obligations under the Protocol, with a particular emphasis on the HFCs phase-down.

To date, two of the four planned pilot training workshops have been successfully conducted. The first pilot workshop was held on 20–21 November 2023 in Phuket, Thailand, and the second on 20–21 June 2024 in Panama City, Panama. These sessions brought together NOOs from various regions and provided a platform for in-depth discussions, peer learning, and the exchange of experiences. Importantly, the second workshop also featured an open dialogue format under the NOO Forum, which facilitated candid feedback and constructive suggestions from participants.

Following the completion of the first two pilot workshops, comprehensive feedback was collected and analyzed. This feedback highlighted several areas where the training content, delivery methods, and supporting materials could be enhanced to better meet the evolving needs of NOUs. In response, the decision was made to temporarily pause the rollout of the remaining two pilot workshops in order to revise and strengthen the training programme. This strategic adjustment ensures that the final pilot iterations of the training will be more targeted, impactful, and aligned with the practical realities faced by NOOs in the field.

The third and fourth pilot workshops are now planned to be delivered to NOUs from Pacific Island Countries (PICs) and Anglophone Africa, respectively. These sessions will incorporate revised training modules and updated materials, reflecting the lessons learned from earlier pilots. The core objective remains to equip participants with the tools and knowledge necessary to support national compliance and strategic planning under the Montreal Protocol framework.

Key topics covered in the training include: the development of legislative and administrative frameworks to address HFCs under the Kigali Amendment; methodologies for monitoring imports of controlled substances and mixtures in CO₂-equivalent terms; strategic planning for both near-term and long-term implementation of the Kigali Amendment; stakeholder engagement and training strategies; optimization of Multilateral Fund project portfolios; use of revised data reporting formats for Country Programme and Article 7 reporting; safety standards for alternative refrigerants; and energy efficiency considerations in the adoption of alternative technologies.

This phased and responsive approach to programme development underscores the commitment to delivering high-quality, relevant, and actionable training to NOUs. The final two pilot workshops will

Through this network, UNEP OzonAction leverages the expertise and resources of RACHP partners to support Article 5 countries in implementing the Montreal Protocol projects and activities. INWIC offers tools such as a networking, a membership platform and mentoring, while founding partners contribute with resources such as webinars, training, and event access—all aimed at helping countries consider the distinct roles and needs of both women and men in the RACHP Sector and in MLF-funded project planning and implementation.

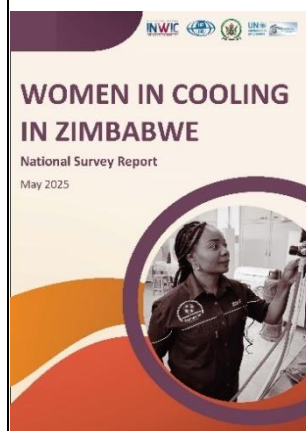


2025 INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY CAMPAIGN

To mark International Women's Day 2025, UNEP OzonAction produced [a video](#) highlighting successful national initiatives from Grenada, North Macedonia, Sierra Leone, Armenia, and Peru. These activities aimed to enhance participation and address the specific needs of women in the context of implementation of the Montreal Protocol projects and activities. SUPPORTING NATIONAL INITIATIVES

In May 2025, the NOU Zimbabwe organized a national workshop to engage RAC technicians, building on the momentum of the 2023 Regional Workshop for Female Technicians held in Cairo. The workshop focused on understanding the motivations, challenges, and opportunities for professionals working in a traditionally male-dominated sector. To inform the discussions, a Women in Cooling survey was conducted ahead of the event, receiving responses from 95 female RAC professionals, primarily from the servicing sector. As a result of the workshop, a document outlining the Elements for an Action Plan to address key challenges faced by women in the RAC sector. This draft was subsequently reviewed and discussed with a broader group of stakeholders involved in project implementation.



IV. Global activities on enforcement and customs

A. Support provided to the enforcement operations DEMETER X and Custos Viridis

UNEP OzonAction has been supporting global enforcement operations led by the World Customs Organization (WCO) since 2019 when the Montreal Protocol was added to the scope of the operation, providing technical expertise, capacity-building support and networking opportunities among national Customs and ozone officers, particularly Article 5 countries. Operation DEMETER is a global Customs initiative that targets illegal shipments of ODS, HFCs, other controlled substances, as well as hazardous wastes regulated under the Basel Convention.

The 10th edition of Operation DEMETER, held in 2024 marked a major milestone, with 110 Customs administrations participating—including growing engagement from African countries. Coordinated by the WCO Secretariat, the operation received technical support from a Virtual Operational Coordination Unit (OCU), led by the WCO Environment Programme, the WCO Regional Intelligence Liaison Office for Asia and the Pacific, and China Customs. The following results were striking:

- 450 seizures were reported by 42.7% of participating administrations—a 28.2% increase from 2023.
- 99 seizures involved ODS, HFCs, or equipment containing controlled substances, reported by 17 Members—a 70% rise in reporting administrations and a 115% surge in seizures compared to DEMETER IX.
- 344,625.9 kg of ODS & HFCs were intercepted, alongside 24,198.9 kg and 11,620 pieces of non-compliant equipment.

Similarly, UNEP OzonAction supports the 2025 edition of Operation DEMETER XI.

UNEP OzonAction also supports a global operation against waste and pollution crimes entitled Custos Viridis, coordinated by the European Police Office (Europol) in close cooperation with the International Criminal Police Organization (Interpol), the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), WCO, and selected Member States. Fluorinated gases and ozone-depleting substances controlled under the Montreal Protocol and the Kigali Amendment are included in the scope of the operation, among other types of commodities subject to pollution crimes.

Custos Viridis is the first global operation of its kind with police as the main target audience specifically extending its scope to controlled fluorinated gases and ozone-depleting substances. While the National

Ozone Units (NOUs) have been traditionally cooperating with customs for the enforcement of the Montreal Protocol, prevention and combating illegal trade may also require the involvement of law enforcement entities, including police, prosecutors, judges and others, depending on each Party's national circumstances. Some of the illegal trade in controlled substances may be connected to other crimes such as organized crime, corruption, fraud, money laundering, aiding and abetting, and conspiracy in combatting of which police play a critical role.

In the context of this operation UNEP OzonAction joined forces with Europol, the Environmental Investigation Agency (EIA) and a number of police entities to hold Refrigerant Gases webinar on 9 April 2025 to brief police officers about the importance of enforcement of the Montreal Protocol and increase the visibility of environmental crimes related to ODS and HFCs illegal activities at the national level.

These enforcement operations provide an opportunity to take targeted actions for the implementation of the Montreal Protocol on the ground as well as to promote national cooperation between NOUs and customs, police and other entities in the enforcement chain. Ozone Officers provide them with technical expertise and specialized knowledge related to the Montreal Protocol, as required.

B. International and regional cooperation with entities on customs and enforcement matters

In addition to providing support to the enforcement operations, UNEP OzonAction cooperates with a number of organizations with the mandate on enforcement issues in a broader scope. Through the cooperation with WCO, UNEP OzonAction engages with WCO on a number of side-events, seeking WCO technical support on such issues as risk management, HS codes and enforcement. This includes inputs into the development of guidelines for customs administrations for developing Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for controls of shipments of substances controlled under the Montreal Protocol, which is expected to become available in the second half of 2025; seeking WCO feedback on the 4th edition of the Training Manual for Customs Officers: Saving the Ozone Layer - Phasing out Ozone Depleting Substances in Developing Countries, and engaging with WCO on risk management issues in the context of training activities.

Furthermore, together with WCO, Ozone Secretariat and the Secretariat of the Basel, Rotterdam and Stockholm (BRS) conventions, the UNEP OzonAction organized a side-event on Interlinkages between the BRS Conventions and the Montreal Protocol held on 1 May 2025 during the 2025 Conference of the Parties to the Basel, Rotterdam and Stockholm Conventions (BRS COPs), held in Geneva from 28 April to 9 May 2025. This event launched an exploratory report ⁶ examining how the BRS conventions and the Montreal Protocol complement each other and what they have in common. Speakers from Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Ghana, WCO, and the Environmental Investigation Agency provided practical insights highlighting policy and practical experience from the perspectives of customs and environmental authorities, responsible for the Basel Convention or Montreal Protocol, and the civil society.

At the BRS COPs, the Montreal Protocol was featured in a series of high-impact discussions and exhibits. Through a number of side events and a dedicated booth, the Protocol's role in tackling issues related to chemicals, waste, and climate change was showcased highlighting the role of interlinked multilateral environmental agreements.

UNEP OzonAction contributed to and engaged Europol, UNODC and Europol in the discussion on customs and enforcement issues held as part of the National Ozone Unit and Customs Twinning workshop & Border Dialogues for countries in the Eastern Africa region – Africa Anglophone Network, held from 7 to 9 May 2025 in Arusha, Tanzania.

UNEP OzonAction explores further concrete opportunities for cooperation with INTERPOL, UNODC, EUROPOL and the European Anti-Fraud Office (OLAF) whether in the scope of capacity building and training or better understanding trends of illegal trade in substances controlled.

Being a partner in the Green Custom Initiative hosted by the UNEP Law Division, UNEP OzonAction participated in the x meeting of the initiative and shared with partners the latest developments related to customs under the Montreal Protocol. Furthermore, UNEP OzonAction actively participated in providing input to the information note on [Free Trade Zones, Trans-Shipments and Multilateral Environmental Agreements](#) and the report on the Green customs, trade and gender: considerations in the context of trade-related Multilateral Environmental Agreements.

UNEP OzonAction also contributed to the development of the information note on Transboundary movement of controlled substances: Legal and practical implications of the Basel Convention for the implementation of the Montreal Protocol by the Ozone Secretariat and the BRS Secretariat.

C. Establishing engagement to provide legal support in the context of the Montevideo Programme

In 2025 UNEP OzonAction established cooperation with the Montevideo Programme V under the UNEP Law Division on legal assistance to support the implementation of the Montreal Protocol and its Kigali Amendment in Article 5 countries. The Fifth Montevideo Programme for the Development and Periodic Review of Environmental Law (Montevideo Programme V) is a ten-year intergovernmental programme designed to promote the development and implementation of environmental rule of law and strengthen the related capacity in countries. Support offered to NOUs is complementary to the policy and technical assistance provided by the UNEP OzonAction. It brings together the expertise of the Law Branch and the UNEP OzonAction Branch, thereby supporting Parties to the Montreal Protocol in a coordinated manner. The proposed assistance is not intended to duplicate or overlap with existing projects already being implemented by Article 5 countries, particularly those under the Institutional Strengthening programme. It focuses on specialized legal assistance in preparing terms of references for a legislative and policy review, outreach to potential experts who could conduct the legislation and policy review and screening of possible experts among other types of assistance.

Together with the Montevideo Programme and the Ozone Secretariat the UNEP OzonAction is in the process of finalizing the report on Fostering a Culture of Compliance: enforcement measures for domestic legislation under the Montreal Protocol. The report seeks to address possible gaps in implementation and enforcement. By expanding the repertoire of enforcement measures beyond the punitive to the remedial, authorities would be in the position to build and maintain a culture of compliance.

D. iPIC platform support

iPIC is an informal and voluntary system that helps countries share information about anticipated trade in ODS, HFCs, and related products. It allows parties to consult each other through designated contact points before shipments of these controlled substances takes place.

During the previous reporting period, UNEP OzonAction continued to deliver iPIC core services, including ongoing support for informal consultations on the import and export of substances controlled under the Montreal Protocol. UNEP OzonAction assisted parties with registering newly designated focal points, managing user access, and updating accounts on the iPIC online platform.

Minor enhancements were made to the platform's functionality and interface design, along with regular troubleshooting to ensure a smooth and user-friendly experience.

Annex 8 – Report on the use of CAP staff time

1. Decision 70/10(d)(ii) requested UNEP to continue providing reports on the utilization of CAP) staff for Multilateral Fund Montreal Protocol activities according to the following five categories:

- Projects and services approved by the Executive Committee.
- Pursuing synergies or implementing joint activities with other non-Multilateral Fund partnerships and initiatives.
- Mobilizing resources for ozone protection activities from entities outside of Multilateral Fund.
- UNEP-wide processes and activities.
- Administrative activities.

2. For the period September 2024 through August 2025, UNEP continued to ensure that all staff paid through CAP were dedicated to the delivery of the activities, services and projects approved by the Executive Committee via the Business Plan and CAP Work Programme. This was done primarily through:

- Work planning. All Regional Coordinators and Global Activity Leaders have developed their individual e-Performance work plans in close consultation with the Head of OzonAction, and all other staff have developed theirs in close consultation with the Regional Coordinators or the Global Fund Management Officer. The individual work plans reflect the goals and priorities set for the staff member for this reporting period. Collectively, the implementation of these work plans reflected the projects and services approved by the Executive Committee for the reporting period.
- Monitoring of legal instruments. The Head of OzonAction reviews all proposed legal instruments with countries and organisations, commercial companies, terms of reference for consultants, as well as requests for payments, thus ensuring that Multilateral Fund resources are used for the intended purpose. The Regional Coordinators ensure that funding is commensurate with planned activities as well as review expenditure and progress reports to ensure that they reflect implementation by the countries and consultants.
- Regular communication with CAP teams. Through regular communication with regional coordinators and other team members, review of outputs and deliverables, and participation in events/missions organised by CAP, the Head of OzonAction keeps an overview on activities undertaken by CAP staff. The Regional Coordinators also play a key role in monitoring use of CAP staff time. Regional Coordinators report to the Head of OzonAction as their first reporting officer and to the Law Division Deputy Director as their second reporting officer.
- Accountability framework. As part of UNEP's accountability framework, all staff are individually responsible for the use of their time and delivery of their own work, which is to deliver Multilateral Fund outputs.
